Students are the Measure of Our Success

n the current era of economic competitiveness, student success is a national priority. The unprecedented White House summit on community colleges emphasized the importance of workforce training and cited education as the key to future economic growth.

Pensacola State College has embraced these concepts since its doors opened in 1948. Now, more than ever, we are at the forefront of providing programs that lead to meaningful employment and encourage entrepreneurship.

In January 2011, the college launched its first baccalaureate degree programs — Bachelor of Applied Science and Bachelor of Science in Nursing — with 158 students in the inaugural class.

The college also began six new workforce programs leading to associate degrees and certificates. This array of programs provides just one example of the college working with local businesses and industry to identify unfilled jobs and growing job markets and then providing the appropriate education, training and skills to meet those needs.

A measure of the success of our programs is by the success of our students, i.e., graduation and job placement. For the third straight year, Pensacola State was named to the prestigious list of Top 100 Associate Degree Producers in the nation.

Student success at Pensacola State reaches far beyond earning a degree or certificate. Student success includes opportunities to explore new ideas; activities that encourage leadership, community service, personal growth; and support systems of dedicated faculty, caring advisors and ample student resources.

While it is impossible to include every accolade, this annual report provides a glimpse of some of our achievements, such as:

• Phi Theta Kappa member Wesley Greene was one of 20 students nationwide selected for the 2011 Guistwhite Scholarship.

• During 2010-2011, Pirate teams produced four Academic All-American winners, 16 Academic All-State winners and 31 Academic All-Conference winners.

• Renowned artist Christo was honored as the Switzer Distinguished Artist. A record-breaking 21,082 visitors came to the "Christo and Jeanne-Claude" exhibition at the Visual Arts Gallery, and nearly 900 art enthusiasts attended his lecture.

• The Lady Pirates basketball team ended a perfect season winning the State Championship and placing third in the nation.

• Pensacola State once again was named a Military Friendly School by G.I. Jobs magazine.

• The first Regional SkillsUSA/Worlds of Possibilities Career Expo hosted on the Pensacola campus drew almost 2,000 eighth graders from Escambia and Santa Rosa county schools.

• Collegiate High School saw overall enrollment increase 19 percent with classes full to capacity.

• Through the Foundation's efforts, 2,754 scholarships worth almost \$900,000 were awarded to deserving students.

• WSRE, PBS for the Gulf Coast, won two Bronze Telly Awards for original documentaries.

For more than six decades, Pensacola State has provided opportunities for dreams to become reality, for careers to flourish. We look forward to a future full of promise for our students and the community we serve.

Top 100 Ranking

For the third straight year, Community College Week magazine named Pensacola State College to its list of Top 100 Associate Degree Producers in the nation.

Community College Week's June 13 issue ranked Pensacola State No. 9 under four-year institutions for associate degrees awarded in Liberal Arts and Sciences, General Studies and Humanities. Pensacola State placed No. 23 under four-year institutions for associate degrees awarded in all disciplines.

The college also ranked in the Top 100 for associate degrees awarded in three categories: African Americans, American Indians and Non-Minorities.

"This data shows we have a support system — academic advisors, financial aid, caring faculty — to give our students every opportunity to succeed," said President Ed Meadows.

Inaugural Classes Begin for Baccalaureate Programs

Jan. 6, 2011 was an historic day for Pensacola State as students began classes in the college's first baccalaureate programs.

Open to students with associate degrees, the Bachelor of Applied Science program welcomed 99 students in areas of Graphic Design, Health Care Management, Organizational Administration and Public Safety/Public Service.

The Bachelor of Science in Nursing program welcomed 59 licensed registered nurses with associate degrees.

30th Annual Summer Dance Workshop

Pensacola State presented its 30th annual Summer Dance Workshop in June. Each year, hundreds of dancers from across the country flock to the college's prestigious dance workshop to study with nationally renowned dance instructors. Classes cover ballet, tap, jazz, hip-hop, contemporary, choreography, theatre dance and school dance team.

The new BAS and BSN programs offer flexible schedules and online classes to benefit working students who are seeking career advancement and retraining. Both bachelor's degree programs transfer to master's degree programs, further opening doors for leadership positions and higher salaries.

The college sought extensive input from the surrounding business community to develop baccalaureate programs that better serve the needs of Northwest Florida.

Celebrating Diversity

Dramatic readings, concerts and lectures are just a few ways Pensacola State incorporates diversity into classroom and communitywide events. A popular three-part film series unveiled the history of black Pullman porters, black pirates and black mariners. The series was open to the public and sponsored by the college's Black History/Multicultural Committee, the African American Heritage Society and the Florida Humanities Council.

Highlighting the year was the 20th annual Multicultural Honors Program hosted in the Student Center. This event honors all multicultural seniors who have a minimum 3.0 grade point average from Escambia and Santa Rosa counties. Twenty-eight Pensacola State scholarships were awarded.

New Programs

In response to workforce opportunities, Pensacola State launched six new programs leading to associate degrees and certificates: Advanced Esthetics, Certified Nursing Assistant, Information Security, Pharmacy Technology, Veterinary Technology and 9-1-1 Dispatcher.

STAR Students Shine

To improve retention and success among first-generation students, Pensacola State developed Support for Transition to Academic Readiness. The STAR program guides students through college with a STAR advising team and a checkpoint system that identifies academic problems early and provides help.

Data collected during the program's first three years

indicates higher retention and success rates for STAR students than for similar at-risk students who did not participate in the program.

Program News

• The Health Information Management program had a 100 percent pass rate on the Registered Health Information Technician national examination.

• The Sonography program completed requirements to become recognized by the American Registry of Radiology Technologists.

• Coleman Barks, acclaimed for his translations of the ancient Persian poet Rumi, was the featured guest at the fifth annual Outstanding Poets Series sponsored by the English/ Communications Department and the Lyceum Series.

• On the first anniversary of the Deepwater Horizon oil spill, students in public speaking classes presented an online conference focusing on environmental and economic issues resulting from the oil spill. Students responded to questions and interacted with the public during the four-day conference.

CSI Santa Rosa

Crime Scene Investigation students learned how to excavate a crime scene from law enforcement professionals. The event was treated exactly like a real crime scene and was supervised by the Santa Rosa County Sheriff's Office CSI team. Pensacola

Permanent Art Collection Marks 40 Years

The 4oth anniversary of the college's permanent art collection was celebrated with an exhibition at the Anna Lamar Switzer Center for Visual Arts on the Pensacola campus.

Pensacola State's permanent art collection contains about 500 pieces of artwork, including contemporary American art, photography, ceramics, drawings, prints, glass, sculpture, graphic design, jewelry, textiles, historical pieces and works from masters such as Picasso and Matisse.

National Basketball All-Star Event

Pensacola State hosted the third annual National Junior College Women's Basketball All-Star event in July 2011 at the Lou Ross Center. The nationwide recruiting opportunity drew 40 of the best junior college players in the country and more than 150 university coaches. Pensacola State players Jasmine Richardson and Ronika Ransford competed in the event.

For the first time, the All-Star weekend included a coaching clinic and the NJCAA Women's Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame Dinner.

Winning in the Classroom

At Pensacola State, a winning season includes top performance in the classroom as well as the sports arena.

During 2010 – 2011, the Pirates produced four Academic All-American winners, 16 Academic All-State winners and 31 Academic All-Conference winners.

Pensacola State led the Panhandle Conference in All-Conference academic awards. The closest competitor was Tallahassee Community College with 23 awards.

Additionally, the second-year athletes achieved an 83 percent academic completion rate.

"This year, 29 of 35 sophomore athletes at Pensacola State went on to four-year colleges after the May graduation," says Athletic Director Bill Hamilton. "This success rate is far above the completion rate of nonathletes after two years at most community colleges."

Spectacular Season for Lady Pirates

The Lady Pirates basketball team, coached by Chanda Rigby, made history with a record-breaking season that ended 35-1, with 34 straight wins.

Lady Pirates won the Florida Community College Activities Association 2011 State Championship for the first time since 1985, the Panhandle Conference Championship for the first time since 1994, and returned from the National Junior College Athletic Association finals ranked No. 3 in the nation.

Rigby was named FCCAA State and Panhandle Conference Coach of the Year. Meghan Perkins was named FCCAA State and Panhandle Conference Player of the Year, and Jessica Merritt was named FCCAA State Tournament Most Valuable Player.

The Florida House of Representatives and Florida Senate passed resolutions honoring the team and coaches for representing Florida in the NJCAA National Tournament in Kansas.

The Lady Pirates capped their stellar season with an academic victory – all eight sophomore players earned their degrees and received scholarships to NCAA Division I universities.

Up-to-date facilities that operate efficiently are a top priority for the college.

• Video monitors were placed in public access areas on each campus to provide information, direction and urgent notification to students, faculty, staff and visitors.

• Twenty-five classrooms were equipped with new technology.

• Milton campus Student Affairs building was remodeled and new furnishings were added.

• Energy-saving projects and recycling were implemented on all campuses.

Building Progress

Construction on the \$9.4 million South Santa Rosa Center began in October 2010. The two-story, multi-use facility stayed on track for opening in January 2012.

Major renovations costing about \$600,000

were made to Warrington campus Building 3200 in preparation for the college's new Veterinary Technology program, slated for fall 2011.

• Cosmetology salon and spa on the Pensacola campus underwent an extensive \$750,000 renovation with completion slated for fall 2011.

New Learning Center

The new Collaborative Learning Center in the Chadbourne Library features six student stations equipped with an interactive display mounted on a 360-degree rotating base. An additional station is provided for the instructor.

Students can work together and then display their projects on any of the three larger video screens on the walls. The instructor controls which station is displayed, and students (and/or the instructor) can easily edit presentations on the interactive display as needed. Up to three different student stations may be simultaneously displayed on the larger screens.

• Issue, the college's literary magazine, won first place in photography and third place in art works at the Florida Community College Press Association's annual convention.






National Scholarship Winner

Pensacola State College's Historic Beginning

Pensacola State College President Ed Meadows and Pensacola Mayor Ashton Hayward unveiled the Florida Heritage Site Historical Marker honoring the original location of Pensacola Junior College, now Pensacola State College, June 30, 2011.

Community leaders joined college trustees, alumni and staff for the ceremony.

On Sept. 13, 1948, PJC classes began with a handful of faculty and 136 students in the Aiken Boarding House on the

corner of Cervantes and Palafox streets. Shortly after the morning flag-raising, the rambling, old Victorian house was transformed into Florida's first public junior college created under the Minimum Foundation Program Act of 1947.

"The importance of this college is why the Florida Department of State's Historical

Commission has named this a Florida Heritage Site," Meadows said.

Hayward called attention to the college's influence on the community for more than 60 years.

"Pensacola State College is truly the fabric of this community," Hayward said. "It began with great hope for the

future and many of today's leaders got their start at this college."

Charles and Clora King, members of the 1948 class, instigated the quest to recognize the college's original site with a marker.

Larry Bracken, the college's executive director for government relations, worked

with Florida's Division of Historic Preservation for almost two years to acquire the marker.

Inaugural alumni shared fond memories of college life at the Aiken House — classes in the parlor, ping pong games in the basement, PE in the backyard and dances on the veranda.

Pensacola dentist Clement Barfield reminisced about his father, the late Jessie Barfield, one of the college's original administrators and faculty members.




