The Aiken House, a boarding house on the corner of Palafox and Cervantes streets, was home to the very first PSC (PJC) class. On September 16, 2018, PSC celebrated its 70th Anniversary of service to our local and surrounding communities, as well as the country. For over seven decades, this institution has produced more than 110,000 graduates that are making a meaningful contribution to their workplace and society.

The College's mission and commitment of delivering a highly-trained, strong workforce are as prevalent today as they were in 1948. Our programs, administration, staff, instructors, and community partners play a critical role in preparing PSC students for success in a highly-competitive job market.

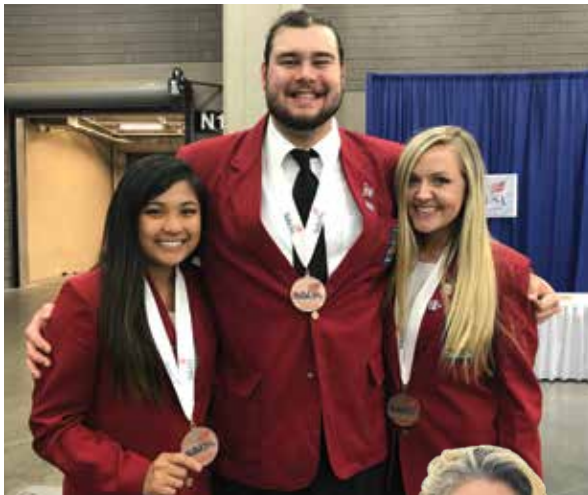
PSC hosted the 2018 SkillsUSA Florida State Leadership and Skills Conference April 30 and May 1.

The students, who were all relative strangers before the outing, "roughed it" on Standing Indian Mountain, in the Nantahala National Forest, North Carolina.

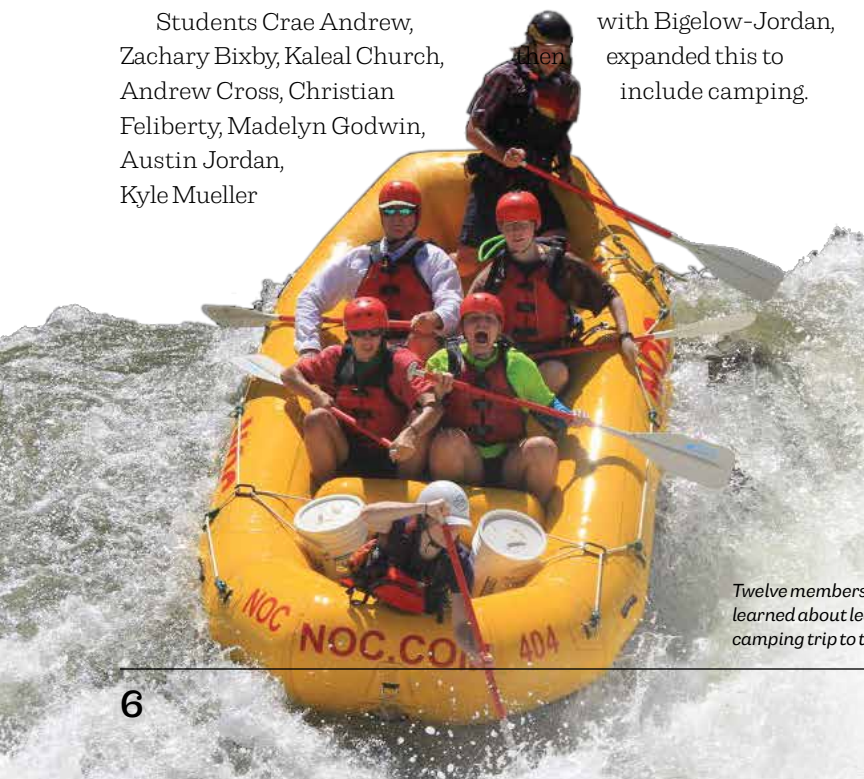
The group worked together to set up campsites, climb mountains, hike trails, identify foliage and natural formations, explore old homesteads and navigate whitewater rafting.

## VETERINARY TECHNOLOGY PROGRAM EARNS FULL ACCREDITATION

Pensacola State College's Veterinary Technology Program received yet another accolade in 2018.

The program earned full accreditation from the American Veterinary Medical Association's Committee on Veterinary Technical Education and Activities.

The program which prepares students to take the Veterinary Technician National Exam (VTNE) had held provisional accreditation since 2013. After a student passes the VTNE, they are eligible to practice as a Credentialed Vet Tech throughout the United States. More than 60 students have graduated from the Pensacola State program.

Sarah Meyer-Paterson, Pensacola State Veterinary Technology program director, said earning the accreditation includes performing a self-study, submitting an annual report and a rigorous two and one-half day site visit every five years by the accrediting body to ensure the standards of accreditation are met.

"They want to make sure we're giving the students the best learning environment and experience they can have. They were

very thorough," Meyer-Paterson said of the accreditation process.

The Veterinary Technology Program curriculum includes the theory and practical application of nursing, anesthesia, pharmacology, anatomy and physiology, radiology, lab diagnostics, dentistry and emergency services. Students also complete four supervised clinical rotations at four different approved area veterinary hospitals where they learn different practice philosophies and receive hands-on training.

Also, more than 97 percent of Pensacola State Veterinary Technology students who graduated from July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2018, earned a passing score on the VTNE.

The VTNE evaluates the competency of entry-level veterinary technicians.

## PSC-UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH ALABAMA SIGN ARTICULATION AGREEMENT

Pensacola State College has become part of the University of South Alabama's "Pathway USA."

The articulation agreement signed Oct. 19, 2018, is a collaborative program between the university and community and state colleges. It creates a seamless transition to USA for transfer students who earn their associate's degree.

Pensacola State is the first Florida College System institution to join the program. The academic partnership enables more PSC graduates to transfer to USA and earn their bachelor's degrees.

"Pathway USA's agreement with Pensacola State College takes effect immediately and is geared toward students who are not admitted at USA as well as students who may simply prefer to begin their college education at PSC," said PSC President Ed Meadows.

Students may choose to have a copy of their USA application and supporting documents forwarded to PSC for admission consideration.

Students already attending PSC also can apply for Pathway USA. A unique

application will be created and available for PSC students to complete and submit.

PSC students who enter the Pathway USA program will have unique benefits, such as:

- Guaranteed admission to USA upon successful completion (cumulative grade-point average of 2.0 or higher) of the associate's degree

- A USA academic advisor assigned to them who will provide individual guidance on course selection and map out degree plans
- Special discounts through USA's Jaguar Productions
- Complimentary admission to South Alabama home athletic event.

## MOBILE WELDING PROGRAM NAMED A 2018 BELLWETHER AWARD FINALIST

Pensacola State College's Mobile Welding Program was one of the Top 10 Finalists for a 2018 National Bellwether Award.

The National Bellwether Awards annually recognize outstanding and innovative programs and practices that are successfully leading community colleges into the future. Winners and finalists are invited to join the prestigious Bellwether College Consortium.

The College's Mobile Welding Program began with a \$2 million grant awarded by the U.S. Department of Labor in 2012. In 2014, the funds were used to acquire two mobile welding units consisting of semi-trailers fitted with welding booths and welding simulators to offer the program at the College's Century Center.

In fall 2015, the College expanded the program to its Milton campus to meet the demands of the job market.

Described as the Heisman Trophy for colleges, the National Bellwether Award is competitively judged and is awarded by peers in community colleges across the country.

"I am proud that PSC has been a back-to-back Top 10 finalist for the National Bellwether Award," said PSC President Ed Meadows. "Being selected two consecutive years is rare and even rarer to win as we did in 2017."

In 2017, the College's Virtual Tutoring Program won a 2017 National Bellwether Award. The program has been replicated at many colleges and universities across the United States.





## U.S. NEWS RANKS PENSACOLA STATE AMONG NATION'S BEST COLLEGES

Pensacola State was ranked as one of the best colleges regionally and nationally by U.S. News and World Report.

In the "Best Colleges 2018 Edition" report, Pensacola State tied for 4th in Top Public Schools Regional Colleges South and was the highest ranked college in Florida. The College also ranked No. 28 in overall Best Regional Colleges South.

Among national colleges and universities, Pensacola State ranked No. 11 in Best Schools for Veterans and No. 147 in Best Undergraduate Engineering Programs (no doctorate).

To calculate the rankings, U.S. News gathered data from each college on up to 15 indicators of academic excellence. Institutions also were ranked based on graduation and retention rates, student-to-faculty ratio, undergraduate academic reputation, faculty resources, student selectivity, financial resources, graduation rate performance and alumni giving.

For the national ranking in Best Schools for Veterans, colleges and universities reported their enrollment of and benefits for veterans and active-duty service members as part of U.S. News' annual statistical survey of undergraduate schools during spring and summer 2017.

To be ranked, institutions must:

- Be certified for the GI Bill.
- Participate in the Yellow Ribbon Program or be a public school that charges in-state tuition to all out-of-state veterans.
- Have enrolled a minimum of 20 veterans and active service members, or a critical mass, in the 2016-17 academic year. Previously to be eligible for this list, a school needed 20 or more students who used GI Bill benefits.
- Be in the top half of its U.S. News ranking category. U.S. News ranked qualifying schools numerically and in descending order based on their 2018 Best Colleges ranks.

The national Best Undergraduate Engineering Program rankings were based on peer assessment surveys.

To appear on an engineering survey, an institution must have an Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology undergraduate engineering

program. The ABET is a non-governmental entity that accredits post-secondary education programs in "applied science, computing, engineering, and engineering technology."

"At Pensacola State, it is our mission to ensure we are providing the best education for our students so that they are prepared for a university or the workforce," PSC President Ed Meadows said.

"Each and every one of our administrators, faculty and staff contribute every day to the success of our students. I want to sincerely thank our employees for their hard work in ensuring our students reach their goals."

Published annually, the report ranks more than 1,400 private and public colleges and universities and is a guide to help parents and students select schools.

## PSC'S VIRTUAL TUTORING PROGRAM RECEIVES 2018 CHANCELLOR'S BEST PRACTICE AWARD

Pensacola State College's prestigious National 2017 Bellwether Award-winning program was recently named a FCS 2018 Chancellor's Best Practice Award recipient.

In November 2018, Pensacola State was one of four Florida College System institutions recognized for innovation and excellence by former FCS Chancellor Madeline Pumariega.

Pensacola State, Florida Gateway College, North Florida Community College and Polk State College received the 2018 Chancellor's Best Practice Awards from Pumariega. The four colleges were honored for programs of excellence at the Association of Florida Colleges' 69th Annual Meeting and Conference in Orlando.

PSC was honored for the Bellwether Virtual Tutoring Program which serves more than a 1,000 students per year. The program provides services to students who may not have access to traditional tutoring methods by offering individualized services from any location or device with an internet connection.

"Our goal through this interactive virtual tutoring program has been to increase access to academic support for time bound and place bound students to help them successfully complete STEM and gateway courses leading to the completion of their respective plan of study," PSC President Ed Meadows said.

## HB 75 ADVANCES 'MILITARY-FRIENDLY' EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES

In 2018, Florida College System institutions were given the authorization to waive some tuition and fees for active duty U.S. service members receiving military assistance.

Former Gov. Rick Scott signed HB 75 on March 13, 2018, which took effect July 1, 2018. The Senate and House unanimously passed the measure for service members who use the U.S. Department of Defense Military Tuition Assistance program. The MTA program covers tuition expenses for service members at postsecondary education institutions. Pensacola State College has more than 300 active duty military students enrolled who use MTA for their education.

"At Pensacola State, we appreciate the contributions of our active duty military personnel and value their service to our community," PSC President Ed Meadows said. "Waiving these fees allows us to continue providing them the support that they deserve as they work to further their education."

## VICTORY MEDIA DESIGNATES PSC A 2018 MILITARY-FRIENDLY SCHOOL

For the ninth consecutive year, Pensacola State College was designated a Military Friendly School by Victory Media.

With more than 2,000 veterans, active duty personnel and their dependents, Pensacola State is described as "the best place for veterans to start their collegiate careers," according to a Pensacola State student-veteran.

The designation is bestowed on U.S. colleges, universities and trade schools that dedicate resources to military students to ensure success in the classroom and after graduation.

"Members of the armed forces play a vital role in our college community as well as that of Escambia and Santa Rosa counties," PSC President Ed Meadows said. "Here at Pensacola State, we value our military service members and their families and strive to provide outstanding support and services to these students."

Military Friendly® ratings are based on six categories: Academic Policies and Compliance; Admissions and Orientation; Culture and Commitment; Financial Aid and Assistance; Graduation and Career; and Military Student Support and Retention.

PSC's veteran benefits include the Dr. G. B. Tamburello Endowed Scholarship; Ross C. Shiver Endowed Scholarship; Purple Heart Waiver; My Career Advancement Account; Veterans Upward Bound; Veterans Student Support Services; Scholarships for Children and Spouses of Deceased or Disabled Veterans and Service Members; GI Bill and Pell Grant.

Victory Media is a service-disabled, veteran-owned business serving the military community since 2001. Their data-driven lists are published in G.I. Jobs®, Military Spouse, Vetpreneur, and STEM Jobs.

## PENSACOLA STATE RANKS AMONG MOST AFFORDABLE COLLEGES IN U.S.

The U.S. Department of Education listed Pensacola State College as a best value among public four-year colleges and universities for the seventh consecutive year.

In July 2018, Pensacola State was ranked 37th on a list of 71 institutions cited for lowest tuition in the U.S. Department of Education's College Affordability and Transparency annual report.

With annual tuition listed as \$2,704, Pensacola State was eighth among the 25 Florida colleges to make the most affordable ranking. Average tuition is \$8,022 for the nation's 681 public four-year institutions, according to the report. In all, the report gives data for 2,606 four-year institutions, including private and private for-profit colleges and universities.

"We have worked hard and continue to strive to keep tuition and fees low for our students while still offering a variety of programs ranging from university transfer and workforce programs like cybersecurity, nursing, construction trades and welding," said PSC President Ed Meadows. "Our workforce programs are designed to respond to the local employment needs."

Pensacola State offers associate and bachelor's degrees, career oriented certificates, college prep, adult education, GED prep and standard high school diplomas.

# FOUNDATION

## CARL DUKE GIFT TO PSC

When Carl Duke retired as the head of Pensacola State's visual arts department in 1987, a part of his heart remained at the College.

An award-winning artist, Duke continued to show his work in exhibits and even loaned pieces from his personal collection to the College. Before he passed away on Aug. 1, the 87-year-old bequeathed a sizable portion of his art collection to the College.

More than 400 pieces were donated to Pensacola State with the stipulation the artwork be used to help visual arts students further their education. Much of the collection is artwork created by Duke;

however the bequest also includes pieces he and his late wife, Jo Lynn, acquired during their travels and other pieces given to the couple.

"This summer, we were notified that Mr. Duke had left a large collection of his artwork to the College," said Andrea Krieger, executive director of the PSC Foundation. "The donation consists of paintings, ceramics, pottery, wood pieces, and collectibles from Mr. Duke's extensive travel – it's a really diverse collection of artwork."

Some pieces from the collection were sold during the Bill Clover Memorial Auction in October. Proceeds from the auction were used to establish the Bill Clover Memorial Endowment. Known for his ceramic pottery, Clover worked at Pensacola State from 1966 until his death in May 2018. He was the longest-serving faculty member having spent nearly 52 years at the College.

Duke, who worked at the College from 1957-1987, hired Clover and the two became lifelong friends. Throughout their lives, the two men often exchanged and

gifted each other pieces of art. Many of the items in the auction include artwork that Clover gave to Duke.

Allan Peterson, chairman of the College's visual arts department from 1985-2005, described Duke as a visionary, and a teacher who drew students to his classes and influenced local artists who passed through the department.

"Carl Duke was the person who hired the original faculty of a small art department then housed in the music and

theater area. Though no one may remain of that original few, it should be remembered that Carl had the expectations for the development of the art department," Peterson said.

"He was the mover behind the creation of the original visual arts complex in its current location. ... It was Carl who wanted to augment the department offerings with

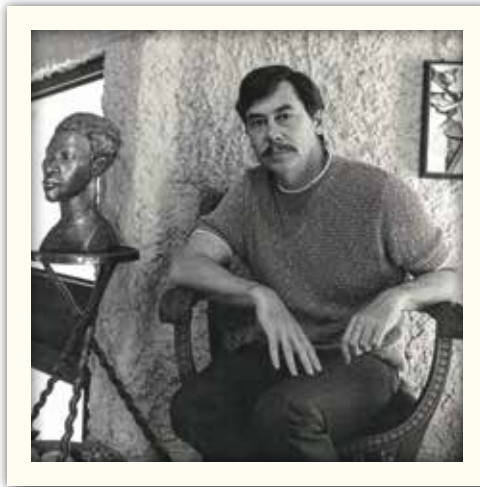
exhibitions and eventually got a position for a full-time gallery director. He hired me, in 1974, to develop a professional gallery program. That was visionary in those days for a junior college."

Krieger added that even the College's Anna Lamar Switzer Center for Visual Arts was the brainchild of Duke.

"The facility was his architectural vision – even down to the stucco on the exterior," she said of the modular complex of buildings that were completed in 1970. Renovations to the facility were finished in 2002, and the 11,000-square-foot Charles W. Lamar Studio addition was completed in 2017.

A graduate of the Art Institute of Chicago, Duke earned his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in 1954 and Master of Fine Arts in 1956. His artwork has been exhibited in the Smithsonian Institution, Denver Museum, Birmingham Museum of Art, the former Isaac Delgado Museum of Art (now the New Orleans Museum of Art), Daytona Beach Art Center and others.

He was the featured artist in One Man Shows at Pensacola Junior College, Pensacola Art Center, Henri Studio in Boston and Madison-Art Directions Gallery in New York.

## FLORIDA BLUE, HELIOS FOUNDATION, OTHERS DONATE \$40,000 FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

Pensacola State College received nearly \$40,000 in April 2018 to help students pay for the cost of higher education.

Much of the \$27,220 donation came from Florida Blue, the Helios Education First Generation Scholars program and Bank of America Dream Makers Scholarship.

Local supporters also chipped in more than \$12,000

in matching funds to bring the donation total to \$39,980.

Florida College System Chancellor Madeline Pumariega and FCS President Judy Green presented an oversized \$27,220 check to PSC President Ed Meadows during a ceremony.

Each year, the FCS Foundation distributes hundreds of thousands of dollars to Florida's 28 state

colleges to provide scholarships to students. Florida Blue donated \$12,760; the Helios Education Foundation contributed \$8,979; with Bank of America giving \$5,481.

During the 2017-18 academic year, 82 Pensacola State students received scholarships from \$42,339 donated by Florida Blue, the Helios Education Foundation,

Bank of America as well as private donors.

Eleven students were awarded scholarships from \$7,779 donated by the Helios Education Foundation.

Forty-nine students received funding from a \$24,827 Florida Blue donation. And 22 students were assisted by \$9,733 from Bank of America Dream Makers Scholarship.

## PSC RECEIVES \$300,000 GRANT TO ADDRESS VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

Pensacola State College was awarded a \$300,000 grant to help fight violence against women. In November 2018, the College received one of 57 grants from the U.S. Department of Justice's Office on Violence Against Women.

OVW's Grant to Reduce Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Stalking on Campus Program supports initiatives to implement comprehensive, coordinated responses to

violent crimes on campus through partnerships with victim services providers and justice agencies.

Pensacola State's Public Safety Department and Office of Institutional Diversity and Student Conduct will work collaboratively with Favor House of Northwest Florida, Legal Services of North Florida, and Lakeview Center Inc. to make all campuses and centers safer.

This award will make possible a range of services,

including specialized training for campus law enforcement, service providers, and campus personnel as well as training and programming for PSC students at all campus locations.

"It is vital to keep our students safe on campuses by supporting programs that take a coordinated community approach to education and prevention of sexual assault on our college and university campuses," said OVW Acting Director Katharine Sullivan.



## PSC AWARDED \$1.86M IN JOB GROWTH INVESTMENT GRANT FUNDS

Pensacola State College received \$1.86 million for workforce training programs from an \$85 million Florida Job Growth Grant Fund. In February 2018, the College was among nine entities awarded \$35 million of the fund.

At the College, the funds will be used to increase the number of students earning industry-recognized credentials and degrees required to enter and advance in the workforce for targeted industries such as advanced manufacturing, aviation maintenance, welding, cybersecurity/information technology, nursing, transportation and construction trades.

The Florida Job Growth Grant Fund was established by Scott and the state Legislature in 2017 to encourage continued

economic growth statewide.

The Greater Pensacola Career Pathways initiative with Pensacola State College as lead, will be implemented in partnership with George Stone Technical Center and the Escambia County School District, CareerSource ESCAROSA and FloridaWest Economic Development Alliance.

Gulf Power Co., GBSI, VT Mobile Aerospace Engineering, Skanska, Baptist Hospital, AppRiver, Techsoft, Home

Builders Association of West Florida, Northwest Florida Manufacturers Council and IT Gulf Coast and Innovation Coast, also collaborated on the proposal.

## GULF POWER FOUNDATION DONATES \$150,000 TO PSC FOR NONPROFIT TRAINING CENTER

Pensacola State received a \$150,000 donation from the Gulf Power Foundation to help establish training for nonprofit organizations' professional staffs and boards.

Gulf Power Foundation Board Chairman Wendell Smith presented the first installment of \$30,000 to the College in December 2018.

PSC President Ed Meadows thanked the foundation for the donation. The first payment will be used to develop CFRE courses on funding diversification, board development, grant writing, comprehensive campaigns, and donor-centered proposals and presentations. Over the next five years, scholarships also will be provided for worthy students and qualifying nonprofit organizations.

# ATHLETICS

## PSC ATHLETIC DIRECTOR INDUCTED INTO FCSAA HALL OF FAME

Bill Hamilton, Pensacola State's athletic director, was inducted into the 2018 Florida College System Activities Association Hall of Fame. He is the eighth Pensacola State administrator/faculty member to be recognized by the organization since 1993.

Hamilton has worked in college athletics for more than 35 years. Twenty-nine of those years have been at Pensacola State where Hamilton was head baseball coach before retiring in 2010, and the college's athletic director since 1999.

"It is such an honor to have been nominated by my peers and recognized by the FCSAA," Hamilton said. "To be included among the most notable of the Florida College System's students, administrators, faculty and others is truly a humbling honor."

With an overall record of 703 wins and 468 losses, Hamilton led the Pirates to their first-ever state baseball championship in 2004, and a sixth-place finish in the JUCO World Series where the team received the Tomas Howard Sportsmanship Trophy that same year.

For his efforts, he was named the FCSAA Coach of the Year, NJCAA Region VIII Coach of the Year and the ABCA/

Diamond Regional Coach of the Year for NJCAA Division I.

In 2008, Hamilton surpassed retired legendary Coach Buddy Kisner as the "All-Time Career Leader" in wins at Pensacola Junior College with his 525th career victory. He finished the year with 561 wins as the Pirates rolled to a 43-8 record, a conference championship and a NJCAA national poll No. 1 ranking for the last six weeks of the poll.

It was Pensacola State's first ever No. 1 ranking in the College's then 60-year history.

Hamilton joins seven other Pensacola State administrators and faculty members – President Horace Hartsell; Tom Botsford, publications; Vicki Carson, athletics; Ed Holdnak, student government association; Ken McAferty, Brain Bowl; Joy McClintock, forensics; and Donn Peery, athletics – to have been inducted into the FCSAA Hall of Fame since 1993.

The FCSAA Hall of Fame recognizes administrators, coaches, advisors, officials, students and others who have contributed at least 10 years of service to FCSAA or one of its member institutions.

Inductees are selected by peers on the merits of their community and state college

contributions and achievements as well as significant accomplishments.

Born in Lake City, Hamilton grew up in Marianna. He received a bachelor's degree from Huntingdon College in 1982 and has served on Huntingdon's Board of Trustees and the National Alumni Board of Directors.

He received his master's degree in administration and supervision from Columbus State University in 1987.

Bill Clover, the College's visual arts professor known far and wide for his pottery, passed away on May 7, 2018. A Los Angeles native, Clover started working at Pensacola State in 1966.

Working under five Pensacola State presidents – T. Felton Harrison, Horace “Ed” Hartsell, Charles A. Atwell, G. Thomas Delaino and Ed Meadows, Clover spent more than 52 years at the College.

Clover had a generous spirit that was quite evident. He volunteered at Manna Food Pantries for more than a decade – helping the organization generate nearly \$300,000 to help those in need during the organization's Pick A Bowl Fill A Bowl fundraisers which impacted more than 35,000 people.

“In addition to throwing most of the bowls for the event during its history, Bill Clover exemplified compassion and understanding for others by using his time and talents to benefit the hungry,” said DeDe Flounlacker, Manna's executive director. “Clover was kind, generous, funny and incredibly creative. He was an inspiration to me, and he will be missed.”

In August 2018, Manna Food Pantry renamed the Pick A Bowl Fill A Bowl fundraiser to honor Clover. Beginning with the September 2018 event, the fundraiser became the Clover Pick A Bowl Fill A Bowl.

“He was a great guy. It means a lot to us to be able to name the event after him. He was this amazing person, with such a great spirit and a heart and soul that was so big. It's an honor for us to memorialize him in this way,” she added.

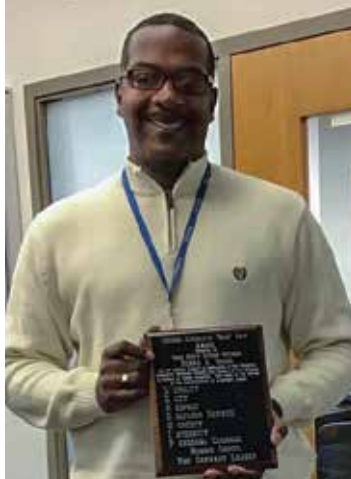
## VETERANS UPWARD BOUND DIRECTOR PRESENTED 2018 BUD DAY AWARD

Rob Gregg, director of Pensacola State's TRIO Veterans Upward Bound program, was presented the 2018 George Everette "Bud" Day Award by the Gulf Coast Veterans Advocacy Council (GCVAC).

The award was presented to Gregg in November 2018. It recognizes excellence in leadership involving people, events, programs, projects and/or teams. It is presented annually to a GCVAC member and volunteer who demonstrates leadership qualities such as being an excellent role model, inspiring others to work collaboratively and creatively, demonstrating initiative, fostering pride in GCVAC and promoting a work environment that is respectful, collegial and supportive.

"It puts a light on the importance of serving vets," Gregg said. "I do a lot of things in the community dealing with vets. I don't think it's about me, it's more about putting the issues up front that vets face."

A U.S. Air Force officer, aviator and WWII, Korean War and Vietnam War veteran, Bud Day was also a prisoner of war, and recipient of the Medal of Honor and Air Force Cross. As of 2016, he was the only person to be awarded the Medal of Honor and Air Force Cross. He died in July 2013 and was posthumously advanced to the rank of Brigadier General. Day is buried in Barrancas National Cemetery.

## PSC CENTURY CENTER STARTS COMMUNITY GARDEN

Pensacola State College has partnered with other community agencies and planted a Hope Garden on the Century Center campus.

In November 2018, about 15 volunteers gathered to establish a plot and layout for the Century Hope Garden. Three subsequent work days concentrated on preparing planting beds and planting cool-weather test beds.

“We now have 10 prepared planting beds and two raised-bed planters with seating constructed and donated by Bondurant’s Ace Hardware in Century,” said Paula Byrd, director of the Century Center. “Visible to passers-by, the Hope Garden beautifies the area along the fence line adjacent to the sidewalk.”

The Century Head Start and Century Academy started indoor seedlings in preparation for the first planting in March 2019.

The idea of the Hope Garden developed after an F3 tornado devastated parts of Century in February 2016. After the storm,

the town’s central area was designated a Community Redevelopment Area (CRA). The College’s Century Center is within the redevelopment area.

Joining the community planning team were Byrd along with PSC professors Jennifer Ehrhardt and Judy Golding along with Ellen Peppler, a lab tutor.

“We are all proponents of community gardens and Ms. Ehrhardt weaves affordable and healthy food choices, cooking with fresh ingredients, financial literacy and service learning into her courses,” Byrd added.

“Century Center students and staff also will be involved in the development and managing of the gardens.”

Future events include workshops on gardening, nutrition and cooking with fresh produce through Continuing Education and collaboration with local garden clubs and the Escambia County Extension Service.

# FACILITIES

## GROUND BROKEN FOR CONSTRUCTION OF NEW STEM BUILDING

Ground was broken on the East Wing of Pensacola State College's new STEM building on Nov. 13, 2018.

Local officials, members of the Baars family, along with representatives from Ajax Building Corp and Florida Architects joined Pensacola State's Board of Trustees, Board of Governors, faculty, staff and students for the event.

Construction on the first phase (East Wing) of the facility began in January – following the abatement and demolition of the Mary Ellison Baars Building.

The \$13 million East Wing will be home to the College's cybersecurity and mathematics programs. The total cost for the entire facility is projected to be \$34 million.

A construction start date has not been set for the second phase (West Wing and second-floor connector).

"We badly need the space for our cybersecurity degree program which has quadrupled in enrollment since it was first offered in fall 2016," said PSC President Ed Meadows.

In addition to cybersecurity and math programs, the 25,389-square-foot East Wing will house math tutorial labs and office space. The first phase is projected to be in use by May 2020.

The West Wing and second-floor connector will be a total of 46,133-square feet and is projected to cost \$21 million.

Ajax Building Corp is the project's general contractor, and Florida Architects designed the facility.

The STEM facility will replace the Baars Building (Building 1), which was constructed in 1956. The facility was named for the matriarch of the Baars family in recognition of their role in making the property available for the College's Pensacola campus.

## LAMAR, REILLY AND SWITZER FAMILIES TURN OUT FOR RIBBON CUTTING OF CHARLES W. LAMAR STUDIO

Pensacola State College unveiled the state-of-the-art Charles W. Lamar Studio in February 2018.

The 11,000-square-foot studio was made possible by a \$1 million gift from the Lamar, Reilly and Switzer families in 2014. The donation served as seed money for the construction of the \$3 million facility which is an addition to the Anna Lamar Switzer Center for Visual Arts.

Lamar, Reilly and Switzer family members, Pensacola State trustees, administrators, faculty and staff as well community supporters were among the gala attendees.

"Pensacola State is extremely fortunate to

have the support of the Lamar, Reilly and Switzer families," said PSC President Ed Meadows. "The visions of these families and financial commitments have helped Pensacola State make this long-sought-after facility a reality."

Charles W. Lamar Sr., the facility's namesake, first came to Pensacola in 1902 and eventually founded Lamar Advertising Co.

According to Bobby Switzer, Lamar fostered a love for the arts and was a faithful supporter and patron.

"We truly wanted to honor him, and are so pleased the studio bears his namesake," Switzer added.

"Our families could not have asked for a more fitting tribute to the Lamar name than this facility – housed in the Anna Lamar Switzer Center for Visual Arts."

## ORIGINAL PRODUCTIONS

Local productions spotlight attractions, events and talent unique to the viewing area with WSRE winning Bronze Telly Awards for excellence in video and television production for "In Your Own Backyard: The Gulf Coast Hot Air Balloon Festival" and "Best of StudioAmped: Volume 2."

An election cycle tradition, "RALLY" candidate forums have been produced as a public service of WSRE in partnership with the League of Women Voters since the 1970s. WSRE aired live "RALLY" broadcasts for both the primary and general elections in 2018, covering local and congressional races for voters

in Escambia, Santa Rosa and Okaloosa counties, along with the mayoral race in Pensacola.

Other longstanding WSRE series, like "Aware!" (hosted by Dee Dee Sharp) and "Legislative Review," also serve to inform and connect local communities.

Jeff Weeks, Sherri Hemminghaus Weeks and Rameca Vincent Leary each produce and host their own episodes of "inStudio"—conversations covering current affairs and local initiatives. Leary also hosts "Pensacola State Today," covering the people, programs and community impact of Pensacola State College.

## EDUCATIONAL SERVICES

The WSRE Imagination Station is a public venue designed to promote early education and provide access to family learning activities with an assortment of educational PBS resources—books, toys and touchscreen computers loaded with educational games.

In its first five years, more than 50,000 people had visited the Imagination Station. Public hours have been extended from three mornings a week to six, while afternoons remain reserved for community organizations focused on early intervention and children with special needs.

Through Florida PBS LearningMedia, local classrooms have access to thousands of customized digital learning resources. In February, WSRE hosted a PBS LearningMedia professional development workshop for 113 Escambia County K-12 teachers who learned to tap into America's #1 educational media brand for free access to innovative, standards-aligned resources and productivity tools.

## COMMUNITY EVENTS

It was a beautiful day in the neighborhood when 25 community organizations partnered with WSRE to host the first Be My Neighbor Day in April 2018. This free community event focuses on early learning along with health and safety resources for families with young children. Headlining the inaugural event were Daniel Tiger and Katerina Kittykat characters from “Daniel Tiger’s Neighborhood” and PBS KIDS co-host Mr. Steve (Steve Roslonek), who performed three interactive shows for a full-house of delighted children and parents in the Amos Studio.

WSRE Public Square presented local events in conjunction with national public television programs, “American Creed” and “The Great American Read.”

“American Creed” began when Stanford University colleagues Condoleezza Rice and David M. Kennedy teamed up to investigate the idea of a uniting American creed. The film frames stories of activists striving to realize their visions of America’s promise. Following a screening of the film in the Amos Studio, two from the cast — Tegan Griffith, a U.S. Marines veteran, and Terrence Davenport, who had worked to create economic opportunity in the Arkansas Delta — participated in a discussion moderated by PSC professor Douglas Mock.

Other Public Square events offered local community engagement in “The Great American Read” — PBS’ campaign in search of America’s best-loved

book. Wayne Flynt, author of “Mockingbird Songs: My Friendship with Harper Lee,” and Nancy Anderson, an English professor and sought-after Harper Lee scholar, read excerpts from his book and letters written by the “To Kill a Mockingbird” author in the May 2018 presentation of “Harper Lee: In Her Own Words.” The event kicked off a summer of reading and voting capped off by another Public Square presentation, “Books Every Floridian Should Have on the Shelf,” by award-winning author and speaker Jeff Klinkenberg. This presentation was funded in part by a Florida Humanities Speakers Series grant awarded to Pensacola State College.

Other WSRE events in 2018 included the annual WSRE PBS KIDS & Family Day at Gulfarium Marine Adventure Park in March, again kicking off spring break in Okaloosa County; a Reading of the Names at Veterans Memorial Park during the week leading up to Memorial Day, which involved more than 1,200 volunteers reading the 58,318 names inscribed on The Wall South; the 30th annual Wine & Food Classic in October, featuring PBS chef Sara Moulton and a walkabout tasting by local top chefs; and a Masterpiece Holiday Tea in December, celebrating the third season of “Victoria” on PBS.
