8 Distinguished Alumni Honored at Awards Gala

Eight of Pensacola State College's most highly-accomplished alumni were recognized at the 2019 Distinguished Alumni Awards Gala.

"Building on Tradition - Investing in the Future" was the theme of the May 4 inaugural event where alumni were honored in five categories: Spirit of Pensacola, Rising Star, Life Achievement, Hometown Hero and Against the Odds.

Denis McKinnon Sr., was the recipient of the Spirit of Pensacola State College Award.

After leaving the College, McKinnon enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps and earned his Naval Aviator designation in 1963. He served two tours in Vietnam and was awarded more than 30 personal combat decorations, including a Purple Heart and a Meritorious Service Medal.

After returning to Pensacola, McKinnon established himself as a community leader and was named the Kiwanis Pensacola Business Leader of the Year. He also received two PACE Awards.

Bright nova, Steve Olesky, received the Rising Star Award.

Olesky earned an associate degree from PSC and a bachelor's degree from the Savannah College of Art and Design. He is now a senior director of the digital creative department at Ralph Lauren Corp.

Gary A. DeLapp and Jarl "J.T." Young were presented Life Achievement Awards.

DeLapp, who started out as a part-time hotel dishwasher, moved up the hospitality industry ladder to hold several executive posts. Friends and family also established the Gary A. DeLapp Alumni Scholarship at PSC.

Young is CEO and president of Memphis (Tennessee) Light, Gas and Water. His wife, Deidre, also was a member of the PSC Board of Trustees; his uncle was a College instructor; and his parents were devoted WSRE supporters.

The Youngs established the Aspire Higher Scholarship to assist African American students who major in STEM or business-related fields.

Selected as Hometown Heroes were Gulf Breeze Mayor Cherry Fitch and Escambia County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy Chip Simmons.

Fitch is a retired educator, community advocate and Realtor, After PSC, she went on to earn bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of West Florida and a second master's degree from Troy University.

Simmons earned his associate degree from Pensacola State College. He began his law enforcement career as an Escambia County corrections officer in 1984 and retired as the City of Pensacola Police Chief in 2015.

Beré Jeweler owner Barry Cole and Northwestern Mutual Wealth Management Advisor Thomas Vaughn were named the Against the Odds designees.

Cole chose Pensacola State over the University of Alabama. He worked in the jewelry business for several years before opening Beré Jewelers with partner, the late Ray Jones, in 1985.

Vaughn served in the U.S. Air Force while earning his associate degree from PSC. He also received his bachelor's degree from UWF.

3 Named to PSC Alumni Association Board of Directors


Cherry Fitch, Denis McKinnon Sr., and Patrick Rooney have joined the PSC Alumni Association Board of Directors.

Fitch, mayor of Gulf Breeze, attended PSC and earned a bachelor's degree in English from the University of West Florida. She also earned master's degrees in Educational Leadership from UWF and guidance and counseling from Troy University.

She was a Gulf Breeze High School teacher, guidance counselor and principal. After retirement, Fitch became a Realtor, eventually moving into public service - first as a Gulf Breeze councilwoman.

McKinnon attended PSC for a year after graduating from Escambia High School in 1960. In 1961, he enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps aviation program and earned the Naval Aviator Designation in 1963.







The Pensacola State College Alumni Association supports the mission of the college. Led by a diverse Board of Directors, the Alumni Association is committed to fostering relationships among alumni and friends and recognizing the accomplishments of PSC alumni and friends. The Association holds annual events to raise scholarship matching funds for the Alumni Association Scholarship Matching Program and engage alumni.

He spent 20 years as a naval aviator and retired as a lieutenant colonel while earning a bachelor's degree from the University of Southern Mississippi and a master's in business administration from UWF.

After returning home, he was named the Kiwanis Pensacola Business Leader of the Year and received two PACE Awards - the 1989 Business Leader of the Year and the 2004 Spirit of Pensacola and numerous other accolades.

After graduating from Pensacola State in 1974, Rooney went on to UWF where he earned his bachelor's degree.

Over his career, he has worked for a variety of companies all over the world, and now provides business coaching and entrepreneurial development services through Co:Lab Pensacola, a program of FloridaWest and his company, Coastal CxO Services Inc.

Robby Sean Fussell

Robby Fussell is one smart guy.

After graduating from Pensacola State College in 1989, he went on to earn advanced degrees and certifications from the University of West Florida, Nova Southeastern University, MIT and Harvard University.

Fussell said PSC set him on the proper path to pursue higher education. And that education has allowed him to achieve a top position as Principal Architect with AT&T Cybersecurity.

Fussell, whose mother still lives in Pensacola, was an active student while at PJC. He was president of the school's College Republicans organization, and was even invited to the 1989 inauguration of President George H.W. Bush. He also was vice-president of the College's Student Government Association.

"That was a great experience," he said. "My whole experience at PJC was positive and helpful."

"I'm lucky, I'm blessed," said Bailetti, a first generation college student.

"The PSC professors and staff cared about me as an individual," he noted.

"When you have people, who care about you as a person, and don't just see you as a number, you can accomplish anything you want to accomplish."

Usrys Donate \$100,000 Gift to Pensacola State

In 2019, Dona and Milton Usry followed their hearts and donated \$100,000 to Pensacola State College.

The funds earmarked for the establishment of the Dona and Milton Usry Endowed Accounting Scholarship is a testimony of the couple's dedication to the College. Dona Usry's history with PSC dates back to 1999, when she served on the College's Board of Trustees until 2014.

She served two terms – 2005-2006 and 2006-2007 – as board chairwoman. She is also a member of the WSRE-TV Foundation Board of Directors.

Milton Usry, an esteemed educator, was Regents Professor of accounting for 25 years at Oklahoma State University before the couple moved to Northwest Florida. He joined the University of West Florida accounting faculty and was named UWF's first Eminent Scholar as well as the Mary Ball Washington Professor Emeritus of Accounting.

"They are true friends to Pensacola State College and, personally, to so many of us here," PSC President Ed Meadows said of the couple.

Pensacola State College was named the beneficiary of a \$2.5 million Charitable Remainder Unitrust established by Ron and Jan Miller. The Sansing Universal Scholarship was established in 2002 by the automobile dealership owner and Pensacola State alumnus. To date, Sansing Universal Scholarships have provided 1,099 students with more than \$460,000 in funds. The scholarships cover tuition, fees and books up to \$1,500. Recipients must demonstrate financial need and have at least a 2.0 grade point average.

Each year, the College hosts a luncheon for the scholarship recipients where Sansing offers advice for success and asks students to share a bit about their lives and dreams.

"I don't think we would have been able to help near as many students without your support," Meadows told Sansing. He then offered an analogy he sometimes heard from an Alabama politician: "If you see a turtle on a fence post, you know it didn't get there by itself."

A 1967 graduate of then-Pensacola Junior College, Sansing attended the institution on a golf scholarship. "It was \$99 a semester," Sansing recalled. "It was all I needed for tuition and books. Times have changed over the years."

But not everything.

"It still takes hard work and commitment," he added. "But you've shown you're ready. You've taken the step to go to college and do the work to apply for the scholarship. So I ask you to chase your dream. If it's to be a social worker or own your own construction company, you can do it."

Sansing owns a number of car dealerships along the Gulf Coast, including seven in Escambia and Santa Rosa counties.

PSC Receives Federal Funds to Improve Services for Low-Income Students

Pensacola State College was awarded a \$2.2 million U.S. Department of Education Title III grant to help low-income students. The grant funds will be used to initiate a five-year program to improve services for low-income students, including hiring more advisors and tutors.

The grant beefs up the College's Pirate PATH to Success program, which serves first-time college students, first-generation-in-college students and Pell Grant recipients. The total grant amount is \$2,248,838.82, payable over five years. The first installment of \$449,119 was awarded on Oct. 1. The grant runs from Oct. 1, 2019, to Sept. 30, 2024.

"It's a real shot in the arm," said PSC President Ed Meadows. "For the past five years, the College

has placed extra emphasis on student support services to assist at-risk students, first-time-incollege students and low-income students. This will provide us with additional advisors and tutors and other resources that can be utilized to help."

The Department of Education's Title III program is subtitled "Strengthening Institutions." The program helps colleges and universities to become self-sufficient and expand their capacity to serve low-income students by providing funds to improve and strengthen the academic quality, institutional management and fiscal stability of schools.



To be eligible for the Title III grant, schools must have at least 37 percent of its half-time to full-time students receiving Pell Grants. At PSC, 49 percent of half-time and full-time students receive Pell Grants.





PSC Nonprofit Center Hosts Training Sessions and Summit

Pensacola State College's Nonprofit Center for Excellence, through a partnership with Gulf Power Foundation, began a Nonprofit Training series to offer affordable and local education for the nonprofit and philanthropic organizations in our community.

The first workshop was led by Michelle Buchanan from Dini Spheris on April 30. The session, "How to Create a High Functioning Fundraising Board," covered the roles board and staff play in fundraising, identified financial models that fit a nonprofit, and defined expectations for board member engagement in fundraising.

Buchanan returned on May 15 to train nonprofit professionals on "Success with Comprehensive Campaigns." She discussed campaign readiness, planning essentials, and campaign management.

On Aug. 20, Dr. Debbie Douma, Pensacola State College's dean of grants and federal programs, led a workshop on "Surviving in a Grant Seeking World." Douma identified how to build relationships with funders, covered primary grant considerations, and provided guidance on how to determine a fundable project/program.

On Sept. 26, Gail Perry from Gail Perry Associates, enlightened nonprofits on tactics she branded "Major Gifts Fired Up Fundraising." In this workshop, Perry discussed the art of a successful donor meeting, creating an engagement plan for donor prospects, and how to ask and never get turned down.

On Oct. 31-Nov. 1, the Pensacola State College Foundation hosted its first "Nonprofit Summit: Courageous & Sustainable Transformation."

Professional trainers presenting included Chuck Loring with Loring, Sternberg & Associates; Penelope Burk of Cygnus Applied Research; Mary Claire Walther and Buchanan of Dini Spheris; and Douma with Pensacola State College.

The Nonprofit Center for Excellence & Philanthropy was launched with a founding grant funded by the Gulf Power Foundation. The center strives to help strengthen nonprofit and philanthropic organizations through education designed to support board governance, enhance the business practices of the nonprofit organization, and expand the nonprofit sector's influence.

Since launching in mid-2019, 24 nonprofit organizations and 161 individuals have attended training offered by the center.

TRIO Student Support Services Students Receive Grants

Pensacola State College's TRIO-Student Support Services awarded \$30,000 in scholarships to 23 students in 2019.

The TRIO-SSS assists first-generation college students and students with disabilities and/or financial need. Students must also show academic need.

The TRIO-Student Support Services Grant is awarded to eligible students who have been active in the program for at least two terms. The grants are awarded during the spring and fall terms.

TRIO-SSS include academic advising, career and personal counseling, financial aid advising, tutoring, cultural field trips and more.

SkillsUSA

Seven Pensacola State College SkillsUSA students won gold medals at the state level in 2019, propelling them to the SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Conference during the summer. Pensacola State College hosted the 2019 SkillsUSA State Leadership and Skills Conference, where PSC won five gold medals, four silver medals and four bronze medals.

Gold medal winners were Daniel Sarfert, Kristine McMillian, Kendall Sainata, as well as Team B in the TeamWorks competition. Team members were Jeffrey Crane, Brandi Duplechain, Dannon English and Shawn McCarter.

Another Pensacola College student showed his skills in the health care field, as Daniel Kipp won a gold medal in Physical Therapy during the 2019 HOSA International Leadership Conference. More than 10,000 future health professionals participated in the conference in Orlando.

Robinson Honors Program

Twelve PSC students spent more than a week exploring Central Europe in summer 2019.

The trip was sponsored by the PSC Robinson Honors Program. The students visited Prague and Berlin during the May 25-June 2 Central Europe Service Learning Trip.

Of the 12 PSC students, 11 were Robinson Scholars. Four faculty members also went on the trip.

The Robinson Honors Program theme for the year was "Life on the Fringes: Exploring Marginalized Populations." The PSC delegation studied how refugees and immigrants live in the Czech Republic and Germany.

In Prague, the delegation visited the Prague Castle, which dates to the 9th Century, as well as St. Vitus Cathedral, the Strahov Monastery and the Old Jewish Quarters.

The Robinson Honors Program was named to honor the late Grover and Sandra Robinson III who dedicated many years of service to PSC. The Robinsons' son, Grover Robinson IV, and his wife, Jill, established an endowment with the PSC Foundation in his parents' memory. The endowment assists in offsetting the cost of small class sizes, seminars, and travel scholarships.

Providing the Best at Pensacola State College

Pensacola State College's accolades were widespread in 2019, as the school earned honors from numerous publications for a variety of services and programs.

Among the many highlights:

Pensacola State College was ranked as a top Public **Regional College in Florida, and the third-ranked Public** Regional College in the South, by U.S. News & World Report. The publication also named Pensacola as the top regional school in Florida for veterans, and the ninth-best school for veterans among regional colleges in the South.

The ratings were announced in September when U.S. News & World Report published the coveted "Best Colleges" rankings. U.S. News & World Report's listing also ranked Pensacola State third in the state and 20th in the South in social mobility, which evaluates schools based on performance rates of students who receive Pell Grants.

Pensacola State College also was named a 2019 Military Friendly School by Vigtory Media. It was the 10th consecutive year that PSC received the designation awarded to colleges, universities and trade schools that dedicated resources to military students to ensure success in the classroom and after graduation. The College had more than 2,000 veterans, active duty personnel and military dependents enrolled in classes in 2019.

Pensacola State College's online Bachelor of Science in Nursing program was the 10th ranked "Best Online Bachelor Program" in Florida by U.S. News and World Report. The Pensacola State BSN program was ranked 114th in the nation in the same report.

Pensacola State's BSN also received honors from RegisteredNursing.org, a nursing advocacy organization. In its "Best Online RN to BSN Program" rankings, Pensacola State College was listed as fourth in the state.

The National Council for Home Safety and Security also recognized PSC in 2019 when the College was listed in the Safest Colleges in America ranking.

PSC Strengthens Partnerships with UWF

The University of West Florida and Pensacola State College celebrated the launch of a redesigned and extended PSC2UWF program, which features new benefits, at a March 2019 signing ceremony on the PSC campus.

PSC2UWF created a more streamlined pathway for students to transfer from PSC and earn a bachelor's degree from UWF.

Students also received enhanced advising and support from a UWF transfer pathways coach who will check in each semester to monitor students' progress and ensure they are on the guickest path to completing their degree.

The agreement also included a reverse transfer option for PSC and allowed students access to a personalized UWF degree audit to track their progress toward earning a bachelor's degree while pursuing an associate degree at PSC.

"When institutions work together for the betterment of their students, it is a triple win, win, win," said PSC President Ed Meadows.

"Together, we are strengthening a partnership that benefits both our students and the community," said UWF President Martha D. Saunders.

"We anticipate that many students will take advantage of the program's extended benefits, and I am looking forward to welcoming them to the Argo Nation."

Additional benefits of the program include guaranteed admission, easy transfer of official records and a waived application fee. PSC2UWF students also receive a UWF student ID, giving them access to UWF events, campus resources and facilities.

In January 2019, Pensacola State College began offering live online courses.

English Composition I, Beginning Spanish I, Beginning Spanish II, General Chemistry I, College Algebra, Math for Liberal Arts I, Math for Liberal Arts II, Elementary Statistics and Public Speaking were the initial courses that began during the spring term.

The courses were held twice each week on Monday and Wednesday or Tuesday and Thursday.

PSC Rolls Out Commercial Vehicle Driving Program

Hunter Davis and Kyle Davis (no relation) recently passed their Commercial Driver's License exams and are on the road, thanks to Pensacola State's Commercial Vehicle Driving Program.

PSC's Career Certificate in Commercial Vehicle Driving prepares students for licensure and employment into the trucking industry. This 320-clock-hour program began in Fall 2019 and uses a combination of theoretical, simulation and hands-on instruction.

PSC President Ed Meadows was instrumental in the establishment of the training program.

"If you start scanning the horizon for workforce gaps, one of the first things that gets your attention is the national shortage, and then the local shortage," Meadows said. "There's a huge need."

PSC purchased one 53-foot, cab-and-trailer training vehicle through a Governor's Job Growth Grant from the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity. A second trailer-truck was donated by local beverage distributor, the Lewis Bear Co. Both vehicles are used to train students in a variety of needed skills, from driving and safety techniques to cargo handling and document procedures.

Students in the program drive at least 1,000 miles in training. When students complete the course, they should have all the tools they need to earn a Florida Class A Commercial Driver License.

Meadows said he hopes the College can forge partnerships with area businesses to help train a new roster of truck drivers.

instructor via an Internet connection, explained Dr. Brenda Kelly, Pensacola State's Senior Dean of Academic Affairs.

"The live online classes offer enrollees immediate engagement with the instructor and other students in the session," Kelly said. "And students enjoy the flexibility of being able to take a course outside of a traditional classroom. In previous sessions, we've had students sitting in a hospital breakroom taking a class, riding in an airplane taking a class or even at home holding a newborn in a virtual classroom."

To take a live online course, students must login to the class during the scheduled days and times.

"This (Associate of Science) degree will allow them to take the VTNE and earn their credentials. They're not just bettering themselves; they're improving the quality of care for their patients."

The PSC program is accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association Committee on Veterinary Technician Education and Activities. The program's high success rate and its affordability has made Veterinary Technology Program students and graduates a valuable part of the local professional veterinary community.

Since the course is live, students will see and hear instructors and classmates and participate in the class virtually. Students also must have a laptop or desktop computer, reliable Internet access, a webcam and microphone to enroll and engage in the courses.

"The live online classes are an effective method of delivery and provide an environment where we know students can be successful," Kelly added. "The instructors also can see and interact with every student in the course on their computer monitor."

New Digital Signage Installed on Pensacola, Warrington Campuses

Birkshire Johnstone LLC constructed the signs. The Warrington sign was designed by Caldwell Associates and the Ninth and Underwood avenues sign was designed by Bullock Tice Associates.





New STEM Facility Set to Open Fall 2020

Construction of the new STEM building on the Pensacola campus is on track and will open for the fall semester. The new facility replaces the more than 60-year-old Mary Ellison Baars Building, which was demolished before construction began on the new facility in January 2019. Ongoing construction continues on the Phase I portion of the project - the \$15 million East Wing structure. The 25,389-square-foot East Wing will be home to the College's mathematics and cybersecurity programs, as well as aviation maintenance, computer science and other high-tech fields.

Phase II will include a West Wing – a 46,000-square-foot facility linked to the East Wing by a second-floor connector. A construction start date has not been set for Phase II. Ajax Building Corp. is the general contractor for the project, which was designed by Florida Architects.

Planetarium Undergoes Renovation

A facelift took more than 20 years off of the Pensacola State College Planetarium and Space Theater. The renovations began in 2017 when the 40-foot diameter dome was repainted by Astro-Tec Manufacturing. Other updates include computerized LED lighting, a state-of-the-art surround sound system, new seating, carpeting and computerized control console. Housed in the Baroco Center for Advanced Technology, the facility's color palette was modernized to dark blue and gray, from the 1990s mauve. The planetarium and space theater opened in 1993.







10 Inducted Into PSC Athletics Hall of Fame Inaugural Class

Ten of Pensacola State College's most-accomplished Pirates were inducted into the Athletics Hall of Fame in February 2019. Inaugural class inductees were:

- Joel Anthony played basketball for the Pirates from 2002-2004. He transferred to the University of Nevada, Las Vegas where he was named the Mountain West Conference Defensive Player of the Year. He signed with the Miami Heat, helping the team win back-to-back national championships. He now plays for Argentina's San Lorenzo de Almagro basketball club league.
- The late Mary Bailey established the softball program at Pensacola State in 1982. A 1967 PSC graduate, she was head softball coach from 1982-1994. In 1988, she led the Lady Pirates slow-pitch softball team to the NJCAA Division I Championship and was named the 1988 NJCAA Coach of the Year. At PSC, she compiled a 498-166 record. The Panhandle Conference Softball Championship trophy is named in her honor.
- William "Bill" Brantley, a member of the PSC Booster Club, taught in the College's Physical Sciences Department from 1965-1995. After retirement, he taught as an adjunct professor until 2009. He contributes to the PSC Foundation and PSC athletics and created the William T. Brantley Scholarship Endowment for Physical Sciences.
- Jim Donovan was PSC's golf coach from 1987-1993. After serving in the U.S. Navy for 32 years, he coached golf at Catholic High School before joining PSC. He led the Pirates golf team to the NJCAA Division II Championship in 1993 and missed a second title by one stroke the following year.
- **Charles Fairchild**, a charter member of PSC Athletic Program, played basketball at PSC from 1962-1964 and was a member of PSC's first state championship basketball team in the 1962-1963 season. He went on to play at Florida State University for two years.
- Dana Gilmore is the most-decorated female athlete in PSC history. She was a First Team All-Conference for two years in softball and yolleyball. a two-time First Team All-State in softball and volleyball among many other accolades. She went on to play softball at University of Central Florida for one season and transferred to University of Mobile where she

was a member of the 2006 Mobile NAIA National Champion team. Gilmore, an assistant softball coach at Tate High, coached the school's 2015 State Champion team in girls' softball.

- Dennis Lindsey was Pensacola State's first full-time assistant basketball coach from 1994-1996. He joined the Houston Rockets organization in 1996, and eventually worked his way up to become the franchise's vice president. He also served as vice president and general manager of the San Antonio Spurs. He is the executive vice president of basketball operations for the Utah Jazz.
- Greg Litton played baseball for the Pirates from 1983-1984 and signed to play at Mississippi State University, however he was drafted in the first round of the 1984 draft by the San Francisco Giants. After five seasons in the minor leagues, Litton moved up as a rookie and hit a home run in Game 4 of the 1989 World Series. He played with the Seattle Mariners and Boston Red Sox before retiring in 1995.
- Bob Marlin was a PSC basketball coach from 1990-1995. In 1993, he led the Pirates to the national junior college championship and was named the NJCAA Coach of the Year. Marlin compiled an astonishing 123-35 record at Pensacola State.
- The late William "Bill" McArthur was a longtime Pirates basketball supporter. He played basketball for Pensacola High and was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame. He graduated from PSC in 1953 and transferred to Florida State where he earned his bachelor's degree. He also earned his master's degree from Mississippi State College and served in the U.S. Army during the Korean conflict. He was a table coordinator at Pensacola State for 42 years and enjoyed a relationship with every College president, athletic director and coach.

Licensed to the Pensacola State College District Board of Trustees, WSRE positively impacts communities through education, entertainment and community engagement.

The station's original productions, local shows and special events provide opportunities for civic engagement, enlightening conversation and exposure to the arts. As a Public Broadcasting System member, WSRE is also part of America's most trusted, valued and essential media provider and serves local communities with quality PBS programming, educational services and public safety resources.

Accessible to everyone, over the air and digitally, WSRE serves a population of 1.5 million people on the Emerald Coast with four over-the-air channels: WSRE, WSRE World, WSRE Create and WSRE PBS KIDS.

Production facilities are located in the Kugelman Center for Telecommunications at PSC and include the 10,000-square-foot Jean & Paul Amos Performance Studio, which serves as a live broadcast and event venue.

WSRE relies on support from individual members and corporate funders for programming, production and the capital required to maintain station operations and meet the constant demands of innovation in communications technology. In support of

public service projects furthering education, public safety and civic leadership, WSRE receives public funding through the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

Among station highlights for 2019, Be My Neighbor Day again brought the community together for a celebration of early education and family health and safety with more than 40 partnering organizations and activities headlined by Daniel Tiger, Katerina Kittycat and Mr. Steve from PBS KIDS.

WSRE also celebrated "Country Music: A Film by Ken Burns" with film screenings, a summer country concert series, a songwriting workshop for Pace Center for Girls, the Pensacola Barn Dance Wine & Food Classic and a benefit concert performed by Marty Stuart and His Fabulous Superlatives, pictured above, at the Pensacola Saenger Theatre.

The station also teamed up with WEAR's Channel 3 News to present "Town Hall: Addicted Florida." This community discussion on the opioid crisis and its impact on our state and local citizens was broadcast live from the WSRE Amos Studio and featured an expert panel and guests from federal, state and local authorities fielding questions from the in-studio audience and viewers at home.



Original Productions

WSRE productions are key to providing meaningful content for local viewers.

Six local series cover people, places and happenings of the viewing area: "Aware!" and "inStudio" highlight current affairs and local initiatives; "Conversations with Jeff Weeks" spotlights notable individuals; "Pensacola State Today" provides useful information about college programs and student services; "In Your Own Backyard" takes an in-depth look at local attractions and points of interest; and "StudioAmped" showcases the original music of regional artists.

New to the station's portfolio of original productions in 2019, "Nightmare Theatre" features Horror Host Hall of Fame members, Mike Ensley, Chip Chism and Lemmie Crews, presenting classic movies with comedic intros on each film's history. The Merrill Movie Museum has provided movie props and memorabilia for the series, now airing in other markets.

In the spirit of good government and an informed electorate, "Legislative Review: Dialogue with the Delegation" is produced before and after each legislative session to help connect law makers with their constituents. Viewers provide the questions asked of the Northwest Florida delegation during the live broadcasts which have aired on WSRE since the early 1970s.

Over the last two decades, WSRE has won four Emmy nominations, two Silver Telly Awards and 19 Bronze Telly Awards, including Bronze Telly Awards in 2019 for the "Aware: Healthcare Connect" town hall presentation and "StudioAmped: Pensacola Beach Songwriters Festival Special 2018," featuring Nashville songwriters Anne Buckle, Tim Buppert and Jerry Vandiver, pictured at right.

Educational Resources

WSRE delivers America's leading media brand for children and trusted educational resources to local families and schools through the 24/7 WSRE PBS KIDS channel and anytime-anywhere streaming and games via the PBS KIDS app, WSRE Imagination Station early learning activity centers, Florida PBS LearningMedia, and community outreach activities like Be My Neighbor Day and WSRE PBS KIDS & Family Day at Gulfarium Marine Adventure Park. Plus, a portion of WSRE's main channel broadcast is also dedicated to early learning programs.

In its first six years, more than 63,750 visitors had utilized the original Imagination Station at Blue Wahoos Stadium. In 2019, WSRE introduced mobile Imagination Station kiosks and opened a new neighborhood Imagination Station at C.A. Weis Elementary, a Title 1 school in Escambia County. Geared toward children from birth to age 5, the WSRE Imagination Stations provide a safe environment and digital resources for parents to engage in play, creativity and learning with their children.
