The citation formats shown here are based on guidelines from the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association, 6th edition, 2010, Chapter 6-7, pp. 169-224. Use a hanging indent format, that is, set the first line flush left and indent subsequent lines. Double space the References page.

## **CITING BOOKS:**

Author, A.A. (Date). *Title of the book*. (Edition, if later than the first.). Place of Publication: Publisher.

### One author:

Pfaffenberger, B. (1997). Protect your privacy on the Internet. New York, NY: Wiley.

### Two to seven authors:

Gay, M., & Gay, K. (1996). *The information superhighway*. New York, NY: Twenty-First Century. (List all authors up to seven. For **more than seven authors**, list the first six, three ellipses, last author)

### Editor:

Long, R. (Ed.). (1997). Rights to privacy. New York, NY: Wilson.

### Edition statement:

Pfleeger, C. P. (1997). Security in computing (2nd ed.). Upper Saddle River, NJ: Prentice.

### Chapter in a book

Author, A.A. (Date). Title of chapter or entry. (Date). In Editor, A.A. & Editor, B.B. (Eds.), *Title of book*, (pp.xx-xx). Place of publication: Publisher.

Johnson, D.R., & Post, D.G. The rise of law on the global network. (1997). In Kahin, B. & Nesson, C. Borders in cyberspace: Information policy and global information infrastructure. (pp. 3-47). Cambridge, MA: MIT Press.

# CITING ARTICLES FROM JOURNALS, MAGAZINES AND NEWSPAPERS:

### Scholarly Journal:

Author, A. A. (Date). Title of the article. *Title of Journal, volume number* (issue number only if pagination begins anew with each issue), pages. (do not use v., vol., issue, page, p., etc.)

Crawford, D. (1998). Shaping public policy in the information age. *Communications of the ACM*, 41(8), 21-24.

Rotenberg, M. (1994). Electronic privacy legislation in the United States. *The Journal of Academic Librarianship*, 20, 227-230.

# Magazine:

Author, A. A. (Date). Title of the article. *Title of Magazine, volume number* (issue number only if pagination begins anew with each issue), pages.

Groups make case as Feds eye legislating online targeting. (2009, 13 July). *Advertising Age*, 80(25), 3-25. (*No author given*)

# Newspaper:

Author, A. A. (Date) Title of article. *Title of Newspaper*, Section & Page preceded by "p." or "pp."

Brinkley, J. (1998, September 21). F.T.C. surfs the Web and gears up to demand privacy protection. *New York Times*, pp. C1, C4. (*Article appears on discontinuous pages*)
