### **Citing Sources Found Full-Text in Library Online Databases**

Citing of books and articles read in a library database follows the same rules as citing for print sources, with the addition of the following:

Available from name of database. URL/ (accessed date).

Turabian's 6<sup>th</sup> edition contains very few examples of citing online sources. The examples below are based on *The Chicago Manual of Style*, 15<sup>th</sup> edition, University of Chicago Press, 2003. For footnote/endnote examples, see the Turabian Citing Print Sources guide.
