I. Critical Thinking

Definition: Critical thinking is evaluating the validity of both personal and shared ideas according to logically consistent standards.

Outcome: The student evaluates the validity of ideas, developing informed opinions or defensible conclusions.

Definition: Communication is the imparting or interchanging of thoughts, opinions, or information.

Outcome: The student effectively communicates knowledge and ideas.

V. Cultural Literacy

Definition: Cultural literacy is knowledge of the histories, contributions, and perspectives of diverse cultures.

Outcome: The student demonstrates an understanding of human culture and its diversity.

Course Learning Outcomes:

Successful students will demonstrate knowledge of the:

1. skills needed for critiquing a theatre performance,
2. aspects of audience etiquette,
3. relationship between the architectural design of a theatre and the impact on audience perception,
4. responsibilities of the actors, director, and playwright,
5. impact of scenery, costuming, lighting, and sound, and
6. difference between dramatic literature vs. other literary genres.

Methods of Evaluation

The Objectives will be met through class discussions, play readings, in-class activities, assigned reading, video presentations, attendance at live performances, an essay paper, and exams.

1. Assigned chapter readings will be used to facilitate classroom discussion and group activities. Exam material will come from readings and class discussions/activities.
2. Students will complete 5 written exams. Final exam is a cumulative exam, covering questions most missed from previous exams plus new material from final chapters and material not tested on yet at end of semester.
3. Students will write one paper. The paper will be a critique of the semester's PSC production. Details on the writing of the paper will be discussed prior to the assignment. An outline specific to the paper will be provided by instructor when the assignment is given.
4. The class after the final performance of the play will include a special after-performance examination of the strengths and weaknesses of the performance. Participation in this exercise is crucial to the appreciation of theatre and therefore is worth 100 points towards the student's final grade for the semester.
5. Playwriting Day is a day spent in class working on a playwriting exercise. Copious fun will be had by all.

6. Throughout the semester there will be individual and group exercises in class. Participation in these will earn students' required Class Participation Exercises points. Any points scored above the minimum are in-class extra credit opportunities to improve the students' semester grade. If a student is absent on Class Participation Exercise days, the student will have to arrange make-up work with the professor.

Extra credit may also be earned by participation in a Pensacola State College Theatre production that meets a minimum level of cast or crew participation. Options include performing a role or production crew duty such as costumes, makeup, sound, light, set construction, running crew, or any backstage duties. Interested students can discuss this option with the professor.

Tardy: Habitual or excessive tardiness may be converted to absences. Tardiness is a disruption to the class and shows a lack of organization on your behalf, a lackadaisical attitude towards your work, and a lack of respect for your classmates.

Attendance Policy: Regular and punctual attendance is required. The fourth absence is considered excessive. The allowable absences are to provide for student illness as well as permit the student to take care of emergencies and/or personal business. Upon the fourth absence, the student is required to schedule an appointment with the instructor during office hours to determine if the student will continue the class.
