You will do the following in this course:

We are going to read different forms of essays, discuss them, and write and edit original essays. Your course grade will be determined primarily by your performance on those essays. We are also going to be asking how what we read and write relates to your life, your community, and your beliefs. Here are the types of assessment you will see in this class:

- Essays (30% of grade)
- Documented Essay (10% of grade)
- Quizzes (15% of grade)
- Midterm Exam (5% of grade)
- Discussions (20% of grade)
- Final Exam Essay (20% of grade)

Grading:

Your final grade will be calculated using your weighted averages in each assignment category. Be sure to keep up with the work because the little assignments add up quickly and can damage your grade if you don't complete them.

If you would like to discuss a grade you've earned, I ask that you wait 24 hours to "cool down" if you're unhappy with the grade you've earned. I will gladly discuss any grade you do not understand so long as the conversation remains professional and respectful.

You will receive a final grade at the end of the semester in Workday. I round up at .5 when submitting final grades. For example, if your final grade in the class is a 79.5, you will have earned a B in the class.

Technology Requirements: This class will be taught online through Canvas, the learning management system used by Pensacola State College. Using Canvas, students will view course content, participate in online discussions, submit assignments, take exams, view grades, and e-mail. Before taking this course, you should feel comfortable using computers; learning basic computer skills while taking an online course is not advisable. For writing assignments, a working knowledge of Microsoft Word is required (note: PirateMail's MS Office 365 is available for PSC Students). **You are also required to have a camera and microphone for Proctorio.** For more specific technology information, please refer to the "Computer System Requirements" and "Supported Browsers" pages in the "eLearning and Resources" module.

Course Description and Learning Outcomes: Please refer to the district syllabus for this course. **Course Policies:**

- 1. Regular attendance is required. In an online class, students are expected to "show up" by logging on at least twice a week to access course material, interacting with classmates, and submitting assignments. Students may withdraw themselves until the withdrawal date, which is the 70% point in the semester (July 14, 2023). After that date, students must be assigned a grade (A, B, C, D, or F). If a student stops attending/participating after the withdrawal date, the instructor may assign an F.
- 2. Before the withdraw date, students who do not log on to the course or maintain active status for two weeks may receive an "F" for excessive absences. These "weeks" do not have to be consecutive.
- 3. Class participation is an important part of the learning process and is, therefore, expected of each student. Throughout the semester, there will be course-related discussion topics. Participation in these discussion topics is mandatory and counts toward attendance.
- 4. All assignments must be completed and submitted on time in the proper format. Late work and work submitted incorrectly may not be accepted and may result in a grade of zero.
- 5. If you are required to be away from a computer on the day an assignment is due, you must turn it in early.
- 6. Extra credit may not be available. Please keep up with the assignments and due dates.
- 7. If unavoidable circumstances occur in your life that impede your performance in this course, please let me know sooner than later. I cannot help if too much time has passed, but I'll do what I can when I can to help as best I can.

Classroom behavior:

You should strive to learn from others by listening to their input in a courteous manner even if their views differ from yours. Your responses should always be conscientious and respectful.

As with your dress and appearance, your behavior in class should be such that we can accomplish our learning goals. Distracting or disruptive behavior may result in a warning or your dismissal from the classroom. If you are dismissed from the classroom as a result of poor behavior, you may receive an absence for the day and a zero on any in-class assignments. Consistently distracting or disruptive behavior may result in referral to the Director of Student Conduct.

You are to use correct Standard English grammar and punctuation in your written assignments. In addition, you are to use formal language (unless directed otherwise), and you are to follow MLA style. MLA format guidelines can be accessed online at https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/resource/747/01/

All assignments must be typed and submitted to Turnitin via Canvas. Emailed papers and papers submitted without going through Turnitin may not be accepted unless specifically requested by me. Your papers must be written in MLA format: double-spaced, Times New Roman font, size 12 type, and one-inch margins on all sides. Colored paper and colored ink (colors other than black) are not acceptable. Your papers will be evaluated in part on your ability to follow these requirements.

The final exam must be taken at the scheduled time. If you do not appear for the final exam, you may be given a zero unless you've made prior arrangements with me that have been approved by the English and Communications department head. In no event will exams be given early.

Maximum attempts: Any student still on the official class roll after the drop period will be counted as having attempted the course whether or not they finish the class. The third attempt to take a college course will cost three (3) times the cost of the first two (2) attempts.

Plagiarism:

Some of the writing assignments for this course require you to use the words and ideas of other people. Plagiarism occurs when you use another person's ideas or expression in your writing without acknowledging the source. We will discuss what constitutes plagiarism at a later date. For now, know that any act of plagiarism may result in a failing grade on the assignment in question and may result failure of the course. See also the Student Handbook regarding the consequence of plagiarism. You will be required to submit work through Turnitin, via Canvas, this semester to help abate this problem in the classroom. You will also complete a quiz on academic integrity and plagiarism at the beginning of the semester that you are required to earn a 100% on. This quiz will serve as your contract with me that you are responsible for any act of plagiarism, intentional or accidental, and that you understand the ramifications of committing plagiarism.

Academic cheating:

If you are caught cheating on an assignment or test, you may receive a zero on that assignment or test. Academic cheating may involve "crib notes," using electronic aids, "helping" fellow students, or any other means to receive "undeserved credit" (PSC catalog).

Please also be aware that lying, as defined in the PSC catalog, whether to members of authority, fellow students, or faculty is an infraction of the Honor Pledge.

Email & Canvas communication:

Please become comfortable using your Pirate Mail and Canvas accounts. I will communicate with you via email, Canvas, and Canvas announcements during the semester. Learning your Pirate Mail and Canvas login information and checking your email is your responsibility. If you have problems logging in, ITS can help you. I cannot legally respond to any emails sent from personal accounts, so you must contact me from your PSC account or Canvas.

I will typically respond to an email sent during the week during regular working hours within 24 hours and an email sent during the weekend at the start of the next week. If it has been longer than the times listed above and you have not heard from me, please do not hesitate to send a follow-up email, as your original email may have been caught in the spam filter. I recommend using the Canvas messaging system instead of email because that system does not have a spam filter that could prevent my receiving your emails in a timely manner.
