Methods of Evaluation:

At minimum, the instructor will cover content which aligns with statewide and institutional learning outcomes for the course. The instructor will measure student performance using the following:

- C 70-76%
- D 60-69%
- F 59% and below

- F1: Assigned to a student who has attended throughout the entire semester and failed the course.
- F2: Assigned to a student who has ceased attending, missed assignment deadlines, or who has been absent beyond the allowable limit (i.e., Not logging on twice a week- remember just logging on and immediately logging out is not considered "coming to class.")
- F3: Assigned to a student who has cheated on an assignment or submitted a plagiarized document.

Evaluations of student progress towards achieving the stated learning outcomes and performance objectives is the responsibility of the instructor, within the policies of the College and the department. Final Grade Calculation

Weekly Tests (based off assigned readings and lecture) – (25%)

Students are required and assigned to complete one chapter test each week that will be administered through our online Canvas course that is linked to this online ARH 2000 – Humanities Art course, section, and the assigned open-source text. This weekly assignment will cover lectures, readings, videos, discussion(s) and the cumulative online test for the individually assigned chapter, which is due at the 'close' of each week (Sunday, 11:59pm). The Canvas modules are not subject to change and student must maintain the overall scheduled pace of the course and late work will receive an overall deduction in the potential grade. Any proposed deadline extension must be approved by the instructor prior the assignments due date.

Discussion Post & Peer Responses – (25%)

Students are required to contribute one discussion posting each week to the online Canvas course shell linked to this ARH 2000 – Humanities Art class. Discussion posts must remain aligned with the assigned weekly chapter readings and content. Students should provide thoughtful and considered judgement when submitting to the required postings and when responding to their peers each week. The required responses you are to contribute to the provide Discussion Posts each week, is a total of two.

Reflection Statement – (20%)

Students are required to submit one Journal Entry / Reflection Statement each week that outlines their newly learned information, content, and concepts. Students must provide their own created content based upon the assigned readings, discussions, and other coursework throughout the semester.

Final Exam – (10%)

The Final Exam will be fully comprehensive to the ARH 2000 – Humanities Art course. The exam is based off of weekly tests and course content.

Self-Reflection – (20%)

Students are required to submit one self-reflection each week. These must connect to the weekly content and must be a reflection of what you found most interesting. This will count toward your attendance and participation within the class as it is a reflection of individual takeaways.
