**Course Description:** A study of the American federal system of government with emphasis on the constitutional distribution of powers among the legislative, executive, and judicial branches and the states. An analysis of policy formation as related to democratic theory and the role of government in the society.

### **Special Requirements:**

Writing Emphasis Requirement: A minimum of three fully developed, multi-paragraph, evaluated writing assignments, not including a final examination, are required.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: Instructors provide detailed feedback regarding the content, organization, and use of standard written English for each evaluated writing assignment.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: Instructors return each evaluated writing assignment to a student before submission of the next evaluated writing assignment.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: Only individual student work may count toward the minimum three evaluated writing assignments.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: Grading rubrics will be used for each evaluated writing assignment. These rubrics will be shared with each student.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: The grades earned on the writing assignments must reflect student performance in college-level writing and significantly impact the final course grade.

#### Methods of Evaluation:

At minimum, the instructor will cover content which aligns with statewide and institutional learning outcomes for the course. The instructor will measure student performance using the following:

Evaluations of student progress towards achieving the stated learning outcomes and performance objectives is the responsibility of the instructor, within the policies of the College and the department. Detailed explanations are included in the course supplementals developed by the instructor for each section being taught.

[Exams: Exams will be conducted in the online Canvas domain, and will be proctored using Canvas. We will not be using any sort of lockdown browser. A review for each exam will be made available.

Written assignments: You will be submitting 3 written assignments throughout the semester (the due dates for each are noted in the semester schedule), each covering major themes and issues covered in the textbook and the classroom. In each of these assignments, you will argue/take a side on an issue. All writing assignments will be submitted electronically, via Canvas. You will be issued topics/prompts at least one week before each writing assignment is due. Length will range from 2 – 4 pages (although I reserve the right to use word count instead), double spaced, 12 point font.

Turnitin: Your writing assignments will be submitted via Turnitin. Some of you might be familiar with this program. Turnitin is used as a plagiarism checker. If you submit drafts of your papers BEFORE they are due, you will have the opportunity to revise areas of your paper where you might be unintentionally plagiarizing

sources and/or not citing them correctly. We will discuss this further in class before the due date of your first written assignment.

Participation: Your participation in this exercise counts for 25 percent of your total grade. Your participation grade will be evaluated by your attendance, participation in our classroom discussions, and occasional participation exercises. I will discuss this further in the first week of the course.

- 7. Develop and demonstrate an understanding of landmark Supreme Court cases, landmark legislation, and landmark executive actions and their impact on law and society.

You may be asked to produce these if questions of authorship arise. Make back-up copies to protect your work from computer failures.

I reserve the right to submit written assignments to the Turnitin service or use other methods to evaluate the originality of the work submitted. I will remove personal identifiers from any electronic files I submit to the Turnitin database for evaluation.

Plagiarism is a serious violation of academic standards and will be punished severely. Students who plagiarize will fail the course and will be referred to the Dean for academic dishonesty. Some students are surprised to learn that they plagiarized themselves when they inappropriately used work produced for one course in another course. If you are unsure, ask your instructor for guidance. You may feel the urge to plagiarize. Don't do it. You will be caught, and you will be punished severely. I have testified at several academic misconduct proceedings. This may be accomplished by written or discussion-based inquiry, at instructor's preference.
