Final Grade Calculation

Quizzes – (Weekly & based on assigned readings / lectures) – (25%)

Students are required and assigned to complete one ‘chapter’ quiz each week that will be administered through our online Canvas course that is linked to this online ARH 2000 – Humanities Art course, section, and the assigned open-source text. This weekly assignment will cover lectures, readings, videos, discussion(s) and the cumulative online quiz for the individually assigned ‘chapter’, which is due at the culmination of each week (Sunday, 11:59pm). The Canvas Modules are not subject to change and student must maintain the overall scheduled pace of the course and late work will receive an overall deduction in the potential grade. Any proposed deadline extension must be approved by the instructor prior the assignments due date.

Discussion Board & Peer Response(s) – (25%)

Students are required to contribute one discussion posting each week to the online Canvas course shell linked to this ARH 2000 – Humanities Art class. Discussion posts must remain aligned with the assigned weekly chapter readings and content. Students should provide thoughtful and considered judgement when submitting to the required postings and when responding to their peers each week. The required responses you are to contribute to the provided Discussion Board each week, is a total of two.

Critical Review Response(s) – (20%)

Students are required to submit one critical review response statement regarding the provided prompt each week that outlines their newly learned information, content, and concepts. Students must provide their own created content based upon the assigned readings, discussions, and other coursework throughout the semester.

Self-Reflection – (20%)

Students are required to submit one self-reflection each week. These must connect to the weekly content and must reflect what you found most interesting. This will count toward your attendance and participation within the class as it reflects individual takeaways.

Final Exam – (10%)

The Final Exam will be fully comprehensive to the ARH 2000 – Humanities Art course. The exam is based on the weekly quizzes and course content.

4. Compare and contrast various works of art as they span through different eras, cultures, and locations.
5. Explain the difference of works of art ranging from the ancient world to contemporary art.

Attendance / Tardiness / Withdrawal: Students are required to attend and actively engage in the online course each week and maintain an appropriate amount of participation in the presented materials and discussions. Being present, alert, contributive, and involved in the coursework is required and not limited to an asynchronous course. The following attendance policy has been implemented in the best interest of the student and is in accordance with the PSC Attendance Policy detailed in the Student Handbook.

"Attendance" is mandatory, even in an online class. You are required to log into the course at least twice a week and participate. Class participation is an important part of the learning process and is therefore expected of each student. Logging in and then immediately logging out is not "coming to class" and will not be counted as attendance. You must log in and participate; read and respond to the discussions posted, review the lecture notes and PowerPoints, participate in the practice activities, check your course email, etc.

The analytics tool within the course management system will be used to make sure students are accomplishing these tasks.

Students who do not attend during the first week of class may be withdrawn. See the No-Show Procedure for the First Week of Classes.

[F] Grade Assigned Early: A grade of F, which will appear on the permanent record, may be assigned by an instructor before the end of the term, in any of the following circumstances.

After the 70th percent point of a course, an instructor may assign an F, which will appear on the permanent record, to a student who has stopped attending class. Instructors will not withdraw a student for excessive absences.

An instructor may assign a grade of F, which will appear on the permanent record, at any point during the term for the student who has plagiarized or committed academic cheating of any kind.

An instructor may assign a grade of F, which will appear on the permanent record, at any point during the term for the student who stops attending a course being attempted for the third time.
