**Course Description:** A study of the American federal system of government with emphasis on the constitutional distribution of powers among the legislative, executive, and judicial branches and the states. An analysis of policy formation as related to democratic theory and the role of government in the society.

**Special Requirements:**

**Writing Emphasis Requirement:** A minimum of three fully developed, multi-paragraph, evaluated writing assignments, not including a final examination, are required.

**Writing Emphasis Requirement:** Instructors provide detailed feedback regarding the content, organization, and use of standard written English for each evaluated writing assignment.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: Instructors return each evaluated writing assignment to a student before submission of the next evaluated writing assignment.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: Only individual student work may count toward the minimum three evaluated writing assignments.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: Grading rubrics will be used for each evaluated writing assignment. These rubrics will be shared with each student.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: The grades earned on the writing assignments must reflect student performance in college-level writing and significantly impact the final course grade.

**Methods of Evaluation:**

At minimum, the instructor will cover content which aligns with statewide and institutional learning outcomes for the course. The instructor will measure student performance using the following:

7. Develop and demonstrate an understanding of landmark Supreme Court cases, landmark legislation, and landmark executive actions and their impact on law and society.

## USE OF TURNITIN:

All writing assignments in this course will be submitted to Turnitin via Canvas. Turnitin generates a report on the originality of your writing by comparing it with a database of periodicals, books, online content, student papers, and other published work. This report can help you discern when you are using sources fairly, citing properly, and paraphrasing effectively -- skills essential to all academic work.

Students agree that by taking this course all required papers may be subject to submission for textual similarity review to Turnitin.com for the detection of plagiarism. All submitted papers will be included as source documents in the Turnitin.com reference database solely for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of such papers. Use of Turnitin.com page service is subject to the Usage Policy and Privacy Pledge posted on the Turnitin.com site.

It is highly recommended that you submit your paper early enough to review your Turnitin.com report before the final due date of your paper. Then, if necessary, you will have time to ask for help from the instructor or someone at the Writing Center.

## EXAMS:

The three course exams will be a combination of multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank, and short essay.

## WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS:

You will be submitting three written assignments throughout the semester. The due dates are clearly noted in the course schedule above. Each will cover major themes and issues covered in the textbook and in the class lectures. In each of these assignments, you will argue/take a side on a topic. These written assignments **MUST** be submitted electronically via Turnitin. You will be issued topics/prompts at least one week before each writing assignment is due. Length will range from 2 - 4 pages, double spaced, using 12-point font, with one-inch margins, and page numbers at the bottom center. For reference, one double-spaced page is approximately 250 words, so your papers should be between 500 - 1000 words total.

## COURSE POLICIES:

**Quizzes and Tests** - Quizzes **CANNOT** be made up. If you are absent on the day a quiz is given, you will receive a 'zero' (0) grade for that quiz. Exams must be complete within the timeframe given on Canvas. In case of a legitimate emergency, the instructor may give you the chance to make up a missed exam, but there will be a penalty deduction of 5%.

**Homework** - Reading assignments as well as written assignments are documented on the course schedule above. Students are expected to come to class ready to discuss the readings.

**Class Participation** - If you are absent, you will not be allowed to make up any in-class assignments or quizzes. An important component of this course is class discussion of current political events. You are expected to contribute to the discussion. Excessive absences and/or lack of participation in class discussions can impact your grade.

Talking or texting on a cell phone while class is in session is not allowed. If special circumstances/emergencies arise, please inform the instructor.

Class disruptions, including but not limited to persistent talking while the instructor or another student is speaking could result in your being asked to leave the class. If you are asked to leave class for violating class policy you will be counted absent from class and may not be allowed to make up work from that day.

#### ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Regular class attendance and consistent class participation are significant factors that promote student success. Each student is expected to attend all class meetings of all courses for which they are registered. Each student is responsible for knowing and adhering to the faculty member's attendance policy for each course taken. Excessive absences can affect the course grade, course completion, and financial aid funding.

**Instructor's Absence Policy:** If you miss more than 1 class this semester, you are considered excessively absent and your final grade for the class will be impacted by those absences. A 5% of final grade attendance/participation component has been built into the grading calculations. More than one absence during the semester will impact that percentage in a negative way.
