Course Description:

In this course, students will learn the foundations of macroeconomics as the branch of economics concerned with how decision-making, in an environment of scarcity, maps onto the aggregate economy. Students will examine theories and evidence related to the following core set of topics: national income determination, money, monetary and fiscal policy, macroeconomic conditions, international trade and the balance of payments, and economic growth and development.

Measure and evaluate economic activity using national income accounts, inflations and unemployment, and summarize the causes and effects of economic growth. 3. Analyze national economic activity through the aggregate demand and supply model. 4. Evaluate the roles of money, banking and the financial sector in the national economy. 5. Evaluate and apply fiscal and monetary policies to economic situations. 6. Describe the theories and problems of international trade, balance payments and exchange rates.

Students are expected to complete weekly assignments, essays, and tests by the deadline. I do not accept late assignments or essays. Tests submitted past the deadline will receive a 3% per day penalty.

ATTENDANCE

POLICIES:

Attendance Confirmation. Instructors must confirm attendance for students enrolled in the course. It is very important for you to log on to our Canvas website and complete the Proctorio Attendance Quiz during the first week of the semester, so I can confirm your attendance. Financial aid disbursement requires that student attendance is confirmed.

EXAMS: The first three tests are taken on Connect. A web camera is required. Students must use a laptop or desktop computer. Proctorio does not work with cell phones or tablets. Students may have 2 attempts on each test. Each test has 40 multiple choice or true-false questions. Students have 90 minutes to complete each test. Students are required to finish each exam by the deadline. Students who do not take an exam by the deadline will incur a penalty of 3 points for each day the exam is submitted past the deadline. The final exam is a paper exam given in the classroom.

There are practice quizzes for each chapter available on Connect. These short quizzes are not mandatory and do not contribute to the final course grade.

FINAL EXAM: The final exam covers the most important chapter from each of the 3 tests. The final exam will cover chapter 3, chapter 9, chapter 13, and chapter 14. This exam will also have 40 multiple choice questions.

CONNECT CHAPTER ASSIGNMENTS: Each chapter will have a McGraw-Hill Connect assignment. Students are to answer all assigned questions on Connect until 100% is achieved. Students do not have to compete the chapter assignments in one sitting. Connect will save your work. All work completed after the deadline receives a grade of zero. Connect will give credit for all work completed before the deadline.

Essay Assignments: The writing requirement for the course is satisfied through the essay assignments. There will be 2 essay questions for this course and essay one is the Global Learning Assignment. Your post should have a minimum of 300 words. Students are expected to compose thoughtful and thorough answers. I do not accept any late submissions.

Global Learning Assignment: Macroeconomics is a general education course and requires completion of a global learning assignment.

The student analyzes, evaluates, and, if necessary, challenges the validity of ideas, principles, or data in order to develop informed opinions, probable predictions, or defensible conclusions.

The GLO assignment is in Essay Assignment 1.
