Course Description: Surveys the biological and cultural development of the human species, using the search tools of anthropology as both a scientific and humanistic approach. Topics include sub-disciplines of anthropology, human evolution, and the concept of cultural adaptation with examination of past and present cultures in terms of survival, socialization, social systems, communication, subsistence, power, spirituality, and cultural change.

Orientation Quiz (15 points – 1 attempt)

All courses distribute a syllabus. You may not realize that instructors spend an enormous amount

of time on the syllabus because it is written documentation of the contact between the student and the instructor. The syllabus details the expectations of both student and instructor.

Therefore, you will have the opportunity to earn 15 points by answering questions that come from

the syllabus. In the future, I urge you to check the syllabus and course schedule, and post your question in the Student Lounge before sending me an email with a question. Of course, ultimately, I welcome

all questions because asking questions is one mark of a student who wants to succeed.

Orientation: "Getting To Know You" Discussion (10 points)

It is time to meet your fellow students and to introduce yourself. In a brief narrative, tell us your name, educational history, your work history (some of you have a good deal, some of you have minimal work experience), and future goals. Please share anything that you think is important for the group to know, such as if you have pets.

Post your greeting. (7 pts. - minimum of 125 words)

Respond to the greetings from at least TWO other students (3 pts - minimum of 4 lines of text EACH).

Always include your word count on both post and replies.

Exams will be given concurrent with other assignments, so plan accordingly. You are allowed to use your textbook and any handouts/notes that you have prepared. I suggest that you do NOT use the internet to try and "look up the answers." The questions and answers are unique to this course and assignments. Use the materials already provided here in Canvas. Be aware:

- The unit exams may not be paused.
- Once you begin them, you must finish them.
- You have one chance to take each exam.
- You have 65 minutes to answer 40 multiple choice questions.
- Therefore, carefully protect your environment.
- Arrange for the children and pets to be taken care of.
- Lock your door if necessary and put your phone on silent.
- Tell your family/friends that you must give your undivided attention to this task.
- Have a clock or watch nearby so that you finish in the allotted time frame.
- If you open an exam by mistake, the next time you open it, it will automatically submit.

So, do NOT open an Exam until you are totally ready to take it.

Discussion Board Grading Rubric

All discussion board postings will be graded using the following criteria:

First post - 7 points possible: 125 words minimum (More is okay.)

• 4 points – Completeness = all issues raised are covered in your postings. Content is relevant and your thoughts are developed and supported with examples, etc.

- 1 point Word count is included.
- 1 point Spelling and grammar are correct.

• 1 point - On time (If your initial response is not received by 11:55 P.M. Thursday, it will be considered late.)

Replies - 3 points possible (1 per reply):

• 1 point - On time (Each reply must be posted by 11:55 P.M. Sunday, or it will not be accepted. No replies may be turned in late.)

• 2 points - Thoughtful replies to AT LEAST 2 other classmates' posts. A minimum of four lines of text is required

Late first posts will be accepted up to two (2) days late and will only earn half credit. No late replies will be accepted.

Two essays (30 pts. each - 60 points total possible)

Where will Baby Sleep – this is an applied paper. You will use two different anthropological concepts and apply them to different practices for infants and children. More information is in Canvas.

Oral History Project- in this amazing project, you will interview someone older than you and document the experience. More information is in Canvas.

ALL submitted assignments should be a minimum of 1 and a half to 2 pages – typed in 12-point font and double spaced.

These assignments represent a big portion of your entire grade. They will prepare you for the unit exams.
