Students are permitted a total of (3) absences in this course before overall grade deductions will be enforced. Each week that a student fails to participate at least twice during the week will count towards (1) absences. A student with a (4th) absence and beyond, will drop by one letter grade per absence(s). Meaning, a (4th) absence will result in the highest overall course grade being a 'B', and (5th) absence resulting in a 'C', and (6th) resulting in a 'D' and if a (7th) absence occurs, the overall grade for the course is a 'F' or failure.
