Students must provide their own created content based upon the assigned readings, discussions, and other coursework throughout the course.		25%
(15) Discussion Boards Students are required to contribute to the discussion boards each week, which are directly connected and must remain aligned to the content covered in the assigned module(s). The discussion(s) must also reflect the student's personal experiences, perspectives, associations, opinions and thoughts related to this content. The student's goal is to establish a thoughtful and considered link to the module(s) content and its relatability to contemporary society. Students should also provide mindful and measured judgment when contributing to the required engagement with their peers each week. To receive full credit, you are required to engage in thoughtful discussion by communicating your measured takeaway with at least two peers in the discussion boards before the end of the scheduled module session.		25%
(15) Quizzes Students are required to complete one module quiz each week that will be administered via in-person or through the Canvas course that is linked to this in-person section of ARH2000 – Humanities Art. This weekly assignment covers the lectures, readings, videos, discussion(s) and is a cumulative in-person or online quiz, which is due at the culmination of each weekly meeting pattern. Students must maintain the overall scheduled pace of the course, and late work will receive an overall deduction in the potential grade. Any proposed deadline extension must be approved by the instructor prior to the assignment's due date. All online quizzes will be administered via the secure, online Proctorio platform.		25%

No late submissions of the final exam for the course will be accepted. The final exam will be administered in-person or via the secure, online Proctorio platform.
