Course Description: In this course, students will learn the foundations of macroeconomics as the branch of economics concerned with how decision-making, in an environment of scarcity, maps onto the aggregate economy. Students will examine theories and evidence related to the following core set of topics: national income determination, money, monetary and fiscal policy, macroeconomic conditions, international trade and the balance of payments, and economic growth and development.

- 1. Define basic economic concepts and correctly apply economic terminology.
- 2. Measure and evaluate economic activity using national income accounts, inflations and unemployment, and summarize the causes and effects of economic growth.
- 3. Analyze national economic activity through the aggregate demand and supply model.
- 4. Evaluate the roles of money, banking and the financial sector in the national economy.
- 5. Evaluate and apply fiscal and monetary policies to economic situations.
- 6. Describe the theories and problems of international trade, balance payments and exchange rates.

Methods of Evaluation:

At minimum, the instructor will cover content which aligns with statewide and institutional learning outcomes for the course. The instructor will measure student performance using the following:

Evaluations of student progress towards achieving the stated learning outcomes and performance objectives is the responsibility of the instructor, within the policies of the College and the department. Detailed explanations are included in the course supplementals developed by the instructor for each section being taught.

Course Requirements: Students are required to complete an Attendance Quiz, 4 exams, 13 Connect Quizzes, 13 Connect Smartbook Activities, a Global Learning Assignment, and Weekly Discussions.

- Exams: We will have 4 exams in this course. The exams will be multiple choice and completed in class. The focus of the exam questions will be the material covered in the lectures. Each Exam is worth 10% of your grade.
 - o **Exam 1:** Covers Chapters 1, 2, 3
 - Exam 2: Covers Chapters 7, 8, 9
 - o Exam 3: Covers Chapters 11, 12, 13
 - o **Exam 4:** Covers Chapters 14, 15, 19, 20
- Connect Quizzes: We will have 13 Connect Quizzes accessible on Canvas. These assignments have 2 attempts and are 10 questions multiple choices to provide you a chance to practice studying the material for the exams. Homework assignments will comprise 20% of your grade, or approximately 1.54% each.
- Global Learning Assignment: Students will complete a GLA as part of the general education course requirements. The student will analyze, evaluate, and if necessary, challenge the validity of ideas, principles, and data in order to develop an informed opinion, probable prediction, and defensible

conclusion. This will be done in a 300-word essay. The Global Learning Assignment will comprise 10% of your grade. I will run each submission through an AI detection software. If more than 90% of the assignment is AI detected, you will receive a 0% for the assignment. If more than 50% is AI detected, I will deduct 20% from the grade.

- Smartbook Assignments: We will have 13 Connect Smartbook assignments accessible on Canvas. These assignments are designed to learn the material in an interactive manner. Smartbook assignments will comprise 15% of your grade, or approximately 1.15% each.
- **Discussions:** You will have weekly discussions, one for each week of the course (excluding final exam week). You are required to provide your initial response by Friday at 11:59pm CST of the week assigned, and two responses to your peers by Sunday at 11:59pm CST the week it is assigned. If you fail to provide a response by Sunday, you will receive 0% for that Discussion. The purpose of these discussions is to mirror interaction between your classmates in a typical classroom environment and to offer you a safe and academic place to share your educated opinions about the material.
- Attendance Verification Quiz: You will have a proctored and simple attendance verification quiz to ensure you are actively engaged with the course during Module 1. This will be worth 5% of your grade. Failure to complete this assignment before the deadline will result in removal from class even if other required assignments have been completed due to non-attendance.
