Course Description: In this course, students will learn the foundations of macroeconomics as the branch of economics concerned with how decision-making, in an environment of scarcity, maps onto the aggregate economy. Students will examine theories and evidence related to the following core set of topics: national income determination, money, monetary and fiscal policy, macroeconomic conditions, international trade and the balance of payments, and economic growth and development.

Course Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Define basic economic concepts and correctly apply economic terminology.
- 2. Measure and evaluate economic activity using national income accounts, inflations and unemployment, and summarize the causes and effects of economic growth.
- 3. Analyze national economic activity through the aggregate demand and supply model.
- 4. Evaluate the roles of money, banking and the financial sector in the national economy.
- 5. Evaluate and apply fiscal and monetary policies to economic situations.
- 6. Describe the theories and problems of international trade, balance payments and exchange rates.

Methods of Evaluation:

At minimum, the instructor will cover content which aligns with statewide and institutional learning outcomes for the course. The instructor will measure student performance using the following:

Evaluations of student progress towards achieving the stated learning outcomes and performance objectives is the responsibility of the instructor, within the policies of the College and the department. Detailed explanations are included in the course supplementals developed by the instructor for each section being taught.

Course Requirements: Students are required to complete 2 exams, 18 Connect Homework assignments, 18 Connect Smartbook activities, 5 Connect Quizzes, a Global Learning Assignment, Pop-Quizzes, and attend lectures regularly.

- Exams: We will have 2 Exams, a Midterm Exam and a Final Exam. Both will be completed in the classroom. The focus of the exam questions will be the material covered in the lectures and in the textbook. Each Exam is worth 100 points.
 - o Midterm: Covers Chapters 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 17
 - o **Final:** Cumulative of all material covered during the semester.
- Connect Smartbook: We will have 18 Connect Smartbook assignments accessible on Canvas. These assignments have unlimited attempts and are simulations of the textbook to provide you a chance to practice studying the material for the exams. The Connect Smartbook assignments are worth 20% of your grade.
- Connect Homework: We will have 18 Connect Homework assignments accessible on Canvas. These assignments have unlimited attempts and are 10 questions multiple choices to provide you a chance to practice studying the material for the exams. The Connect Homework assignments are worth 15% of your grade.
- Connect Quizzes: We will have 5 Connect Quizzes accessible on Canvas. These assignments have one attempt and are 10 to 25 questions multiple choice to assess your knowledge of the material and to help you further prepare for the exams. The Connect Quizzes are worth 25% of your grade.

- Global Learning Assignment: Students will complete a GLA as part of the general education course requirements. The student will analyze, evaluate, and if necessary, challenge the validity of ideas, principles, and data in order to develop an informed opinion, probable prediction, and defensible conclusion. This will be done in a 300-word essay. I will run all submissions through AI detection software. If more than 50% of your submission is AI detected, you will receive a 20% penalty for the assignment, if more than 90% is detected, you will receive a 0% for the assignment. The GLA is worth 5% of your grade.
- Pop-Quizzes: We will have pop-quizzes throughout the semester at random intervals. The quizzes will be basic questions that are graded based upon completion. You must be present in the classroom to complete the Pop-Quiz, and there will be no make-up opportunities. These Pop-Quizzes will make up 5% of your overall grade.
- Attendance: Regular class attendance and consistent class participation are significant factors that promote student success. Attendance is necessary to acquire the required course competencies, therefore regular and punctual attendance in class is required. Students who miss class for any reason are responsible for any material covered and any information given by the professor that day. Attendance is worth 10% of your grade. For every day you miss in excess of the College's standard (3 for our course) you will lose 20% of your available grade for Attendance. Excessive tardiness will be included within this calculation. After three tardies, every additional tardy will be counted as an absence for grading purposes.
