	may be used to satisfy this requirement.

	writing requirement; AI or machine-written content is not accepted.	
	8. The grading rubrics used for each writing assignment will be shared	
	with students and will be uniformly applied as the assessment	
	instrument in all sections of a course.

Narrative Essay: The students will learn the skill of writing a personal story while	10%
learning that these stories often include characters, settings, plot, and climax.	
<b>Descriptive Essay:</b> The students will learn to describe while using sensory details	10%
to create a vivid picture for the reader. Incorporating sight, sound, smell, touch,	
taste, and movement will help accomplish the most detailed mental picture for	
the reader.	
Compare/Contrast Essay: This essay requires the student to explore the obvious	10%
and hidden similarities and differences between two subjects. Critical	
and analytical thinking is required to successfully write a compare/contrast	
essay.	
Argumentative Essay: The students will choose a topic that is arguable and	15%
submit for approval. In a separate assignment, they will submit an outline	
(format of their choosing); on that same assignment, they will submit their three	
sources and cite them in MLA format for instructor approval.	
Homework/Classwork: Assignments to include answering questions from	10%
readings during class time. This section also includes an assortment of short in-	
class writings.	
Quizzes: Quizzed assignments will be from readings assigned.	10%
Public Speaking Component	5%
Participation: This will include staying on task for in-class assignments.	10%
