	is intended by Rule 6A-10.030, F.A.C., additional writing assignments		
	may be used to satisfy this requirement.		
	3. The grades earned on the writing assignments must reflect student		
	performance in college-level writing and significantly impact the final		
	course grade.		
	4. All sections of a course must meet all requirements.		
	5. Instructors provide detailed feedback regarding the content,		
	organization, and use of standard written English for all writing used		
	to satisfy the requirement.		
	6. Instructors return each evaluated writing assignment to a student		
	before the submission of the next evaluated writing assignment,		
	with the exception of a final exam used to satisfy the requirement.		
	7. Only individual, original student work counts toward the extensive		
	writing requirement; AI or machine-written content is not accepted.		
	8. The grading rubrics used for each writing assignment will be shared		
	with students and will be uniformly applied as the assessment		
	instrument in all sections of a course.
