Course Description: In this course, students will survey the history of classical music from antiquity to the modern period, focusing on Western music. The curriculum may also integrate a variety of popular and global styles where appropriate.

Credits: 3 credit hours

1. discuss and analyze music using terminology appropriate for the course.
2. demonstrate fundamental knowledge of the works of significant composers.
3. identify connections between music and the other arts.
4. Identify historical styles and periods based on instruments and performance practices utilized.
5. discuss the basic elements of music (harmony, melody, rhythm, timbre, etc.)
6. describe the functional roles and characteristic of music in Western societies

Student Assignments, Assessments, and Grading Calculations

Test Average and Forum Participation are calculated together to create a percentage grade. Here is a breakdown of how it all works:

Assignment	Percentage of final grade
Final test average from Connect 4 Education website	84%
Forum participation (16 posts)	16%
3 concerts (minimum)	One letter grade dropped for each concert missed

Forum Participation: All students are required to post on the online 4 education course discussion forum once a week, for a total of 16 weeks. Each post should be at least one paragraph in length and all content must be related to music appreciation. Students are encouraged to create topics of their own, provided that they are course-related. Each student post will count as 1% of the final grade.

Assessments: On the Connect 4 Education website, assessments are like quizzes and count towards the student's average test grade. Each assessment can only be taken once and the student is expected to study before taking it. Scores are automatically calculated by the Connect 4 Education website and combined with the results of the midterm and final exam in the final test average.

Tests: The midterm and final exam will be due at the specific times listed below under "Course Schedule." Scores for the midterm and final exam will be automatically calculated by the online 4 education site and combined with the results of the assessments in the final test average.

Listening Requirement: Listening is an essential part of this course. Therefore, each student is expected to devote adequate time *actively* listening to the recorded musical compositions which have been assigned in the course. One listening run-through of each recording is not enough! Three times for every musical work is a good starting point, but it may be necessary to listen several more times. Remember, there is always something new to learn at each hearing, no matter how much experience a listener has.

Concert Attendance: All students will be required to attend a minimum of **THREE (3)** live, musical performances chosen from an approved list. Failure to meet this requirement means a lowering of the student's grade by one letter for each concert/performance below the required three.

Extra Credit: Students may earn extra credit by attendance at two performances (also from the approved list) beyond the requirement. Students will receive 5% towards their final grade for the first extra performance and 5% for the second extra performance. All extra credit will be added to the student's final grade.

Notice! There are concerts where limited free tickets are available. Tickets will be available three weeks before the event at the Lyceum ticket office in building 8 of the main campus. You must sign in at the beginning of the concert and sign out at the end of the concert with the Lyceum monitor who will be stationed at the entrance of the performance hall.
