Because an extensive amount of writing is intended by Rule 6A-10.030, F.A.C., additional writing assignments may be used to satisfy this requirement.</li> <li>The grades earned on the writing assignments must reflect student performance in college-level writing and significantly impact the final course grade.</li> <li>All sections of the course must meet all requirements.</li> <li>Instructors provide detailed feedback regarding the content, organization, and use of standard written English for all writing used to satisfy the requirement.</li> <li>Instructors return each evaluated writing assignment to a student before the submission of the next evaluated writing assignment, with the exception of a final exam used to satisfy the requirement.</li> <li>Only individual, original student work counts toward the extensive writing requirement; Al or machine-written content is not accepted.</li> <li>The grading rubrics used for each writing assignment will be shared with students and will be uniformly applied as the assessment instrument in all sections of a course.</li> </ol>
