Meaning, a (4th) absence will result in the highest overall course grade being a 'B', and (5th) absence resulting in a 'C', and (6th) resulting in a 'D' and if a (7th) absence occurs, the overall grade for the course is a 'F' or failure.</p> <p>Students that are late by more than (10) minutes to the required meeting pattern will be counted towards the overall absence policy whereas two late arrivals are the equivalent of one absence. This too reflects the overall scoring for the course.</p>
<p>[F] Grade Assigned</p>	<p>A grade of F, which will appear on the permanent record, may be assigned by an instructor before the end of the term, in any of the following circumstances. After the 70th percent point of a course, an instructor may assign an F, which will appear on the permanent record, to a student who has stopped attending class. An instructor may assign a grade of F, which will appear on the permanent record, at any point during the term for the student who has plagiarized or committed academic cheating of any kind.</p> <p>An instructor may assign a grade of F, which will appear on the permanent record, at any point during the term for the student who stops attending a course being attempted for the third time.</p>
